Shorthanded Indians' Junior Varsity falls at Athens Christian

Not only was Cruz Shook already out of action due to an injury and several Indians doing double duty and available for just one or two quarters for JV play but Trace Moss, who led a victory over Commerce a week earlier, was unavailable due to

The Indians gave Athens Christian a battle in the first quarter, overcoming an early 8-2 deficit for just a 12-10 Eagles lead at quarter's end with Dallas Manus contributing five points in his only quarter of play. The remainder of the game proved difficult for the Indians, however, as the Eagles broke away for a 30-14 lead at intermission and a 44-19 advantage after three quarters on the way to a 61-28 victory.

Seven of ten players seeing widely varying lengths of playing time in the game entered the scoring column with highlights by quarter being four points by Jordan Jacobs in the second, five by Aaron Dodson in the third, and three for four free throw shooting by Garrett Bradshaw in the fourth.

Dodson took scoring honors for the game with 7 points with Jacobs and Manus close behind with 6 and 5 respectively. Bradshaw led his team in assists with 2 according to your reporter's unofficial tally.

The Lady Indians continued to dominate the game in the third quarter as Karlie Albach contributed a steal and coast to coast run and a trey in just forty nine seconds, ending at the 1:05 mark for a bulging 26-10 Towns lead.

Points would be hard to come by for the Lady Indians after that, however, as the Lady Eagles sank just their third field goal of the game with eight seconds left in the third quarter for a 26-12 score entering the fourth. The Lady Eagles then outscored the Lady Indians 6-1
