Winter Safety Tips Courtesy of SERVPRO:

Everyone wants to keep their homes and workspaces warm during the winter. In an effort to keep heating costs down, many residents and employees will turn to alternative heat sources, such as fireplaces, wood burning stoves and portable space heaters. When used and maintained as directed, these methods can effectively warm your home or office. However, there is also an inherent danger, as heating equipment is the leading cause of home fires during winter months.

Safety Tips:

- Never use the oven, range or stove to heat your home.
- Never burn trash, paper or green wood in your fireplace. These items cause heavy creosote buildup, which could eventually start a fire in your chimney.
- Only buy heaters evaluated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Purchase electric heaters with a thermostat control mechanism that will switch off should the heater tip over.
- Never use electric heaters to dry clothes or other objects. Keep space heaters at least three feet away from any combustibles.
- Plug your electric heater directly into the wall – do not use an extension cord or a power strip.
- Always unplug your electric heater when it is not in use.

"State Park courses are affordable and challenging, which make them a great option for young golfers," said State Park Golf Director Arnie Page.

"Golf helps children develop concentration skills, character and sportsmanship. That's why we are so pleased to be able to offer this year-long tour that can take young golfers to all corners of the state."

The 18-hole fee is \$125 for boys 6-18 and girls 10-18. The 9-hole fee for girls 6-9 is \$95, and additional children in the same family can register for only \$60.

"This tournament is unique because we don't charge membership fees and we allow family members to get involved," said Karl Gross, the tour's director and PGA pro at Highland Walk Golf

Course. "We even encourage parents to serve as caddies for their children."

Celebrate Arbor Day 2010

Residents of Georgia will celebrate Arbor Day 2010 on Feb. 19. While National Arbor Day is held on the last Friday in April, several states, including Georgia, observe the holiday at a time best suited for tree planting for their residents.

The best way to celebrate Arbor Day is to plant trees. The Arbor Day Foundation's Web site (www.arborday.org) offers many helpful tips to celebrate the tree-planters' holiday, from how to plant a tree to selecting the right tree for the right place.

To find out which trees grow best in Georgia, consult the Arbor Day Foundation's Hardiness Zone Map at www.arborday.org/treeinfo.

Georgia has 125 cities and towns that were honored by the Arbor Day Foundation as a Tree City USA community. Tree City USA recognizes communities that are committed to its trees. More than 135 million Americans live in a Tree City USA community. To see a list of Tree City USA communities, go to www.arborday.org/programs.

The first Arbor Day was celebrated in Nebraska on April 10, 1872, thanks to a resolution proposed by Nebraska

City, Neb., resident J. Sterling Morton. Morton, a civic leader, agriculturist, and former newspaper editor, urged Nebraskans to "set aside one day to plant trees, both forest and fruit." The tree-planting holiday was so popular that by 1920, more than 45 states and U.S. territories annually celebrated Arbor Day. Today, Arbor Day is observed in all 50 states and in countries around the world.

The live oak, Quercus virginiana, was adopted as Georgia's state tree in 1937 at the request of the Edmund Burke Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The USS Constitution, better known as "Old Ironsides," earned its nickname from the hull made out of the famously hard live oak wood and was known for repelling British cannonballs. The famous oak has also been voted as America's National Tree.

The Arbor Day Foundation is a nonprofit conservation organization of nearly one million members, with a mission to inspire people to plant, nurture, and celebrate trees.
