Mountain Lions in Sunday sweep to remain undefeated at 11-0

Young Harris College hitters pounded out 17 hits and Brandon Curson contributed at the plate and on the mound as the Mountain Lions finished off a three-game sweep of Potomac State College with a 12-8 victory Sunday at Zell B. Miller Field in Young Harris. The victory improved the Mountain Lions' record to 11-0 on the season.

Six different Mountain Lions collected at least two hits, with Will Callaway and Robby Swab each picking up three to lead the team. Chris Holloway, Matt Lowery, Matt Lobacz and Curson each had two. The top seven batters in the order combined to go 15-for-29 (.517). Holloway, Daniel Marsh and Curson each drove in a pair of runs, as well.

Brian Holmes (1-0), pitching on a pre-determined pitch count, was awarded the victory. He pitched four and one-third innings, allowing six runs on six hits and five walks. He struck out five batters before giving the ball to Kendrick McDonald, who finished the fifth inning by retiring the only two batters he faced. Curson, who homered in Saturday's 11-9 victory, was solid in relief, allowing two runs over four innings. He allowed five hits and walked two batters while striking out four en route to his first save.

Second-ranked Wallace State-Hanceville used a pair of big innings to defeat Young Harris 7-1 in the semifinals of the Ringor Fastpitch Invitational in Aiken, S.C., Sunday. Wallace State scored three runs in the fourth and four more in the fifth to take command of the game. Meanwhile, their pitcher was rolling, holding the Mountain Lions (6-4 overall) to just three hits.

Lady Vikings net 9-0 victory over Lady Mountain Lions

Berry College's women's tennis team rolled to a 9-0 victory over Young Harris College in a non-conference match at Brasstown Valley Resort in Young Harris.

The Vikings didn't look like they were playing in their first match of the spring, winning all six singles matches in straight sets, including 6-0, 6-0 victories in the No. 1 and No. 4 positions. The other four matches were 6-1, 6-0 Berry victories.

Berry is a perennial NAIA powerhouse that is not eligible for national rankings this year as it transitions from the NAIA to NCAA Division III. Last year, Berry was ranked No. 3 in the final NAIA national rankings. Young Harris, currently ranked 21st in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's NJCAA rankings, will look to get back on the winning track Tuesday, when it hosts Lander University at Towns County High School in Hiawassee at 2 p.m.


The Mountain Lions are scheduled to return to action Saturday at 1 p.m., when they
