

Mountain Lions sweep Mars Hill

Young Harris Cole Outz had his best outing of the season and Ethan Herron and Matt Lowery drove in two runs apiece to lead Young Harris to an 8-1 victory over Mars Hill College's junior varsity team in a non-conference game at Zell B. Miller Field in Young Harris, Ga., Monday.

Outz (2-0) was two outs short of picking up a shutout victory in the seven-inning game. As it was, he allowed one run on five hits and four walks in 6.1 innings of work. He struck out six batters before handing the ball to Kendric McDonald. McDonald allowed a hit and struck out one batter in 2/3 of an inning.

Herron's two RBIs came on his second home run of the season. Along with the multi-RBI performances by Herron and Lowery, Jake Montgomery, Michael Squires and Brandon Curson each drove in a run.

Chris Holloway and Montgomery collected two hits each to lead all players. Holloway improved his school-record hitting streak to 31 games.

MHC starter Brian Henson took the loss after allowing three runs in three innings.

In the nightcap, Young Harris scored all five of its runs with two outs and went on to defeat Mars Hill College's junior varsity team 5-1 in a non-conference doubleheader at Zell B. Miller Field in Young Harris, on Monday.

After allowing a run in the top of the second inning, the Mountain Lions put together a two-out rally in the bottom of that same frame to take a 4-1 lead. The inning was highlighted by Blake Jenkins' two-run bloop single and a two-run double by Chris Holloway.

Holloway's double extended his school record hitting streak to 32 straight games.

The Mountain Lions added another two-out run in the fifth, when Ethan Herron scored from third on a double steal in which Matt Lowery swiped second base and drew the throw that allowed Herron to dash home.

Both teams collected eight hits in the game, with Michael Squires and Robby Swab picking up two apiece for the Mountain Lions. Ben Hunt led Mars Hill with two hits.

Young Harris starter Justin Crosby earned the victory. He tossed the first five innings, allowing one run on seven hits. He struck out two batters and walked none.

Middle Georgia Tops YHC

COCHRAN It may have taken 14 innings, but Young Harris right fielder Chris Holloway extended his hitting streak in the most dramatic of fashions, delivering a bases-loaded single that scored what turned out to be the game-winning run in the Mountain Lions' 5-2 victory over Middle Georgia in the first game of a doubleheader Saturday in Cochran.

The victory improved YHC's overall record to 24-6 and its Georgia Junior College Athletic Association mark to 6-2.

Holloway's single came after Greg Bowder drew a one-out walk to load the bases in the top of the 14th inning, with Daniel Marsh on third base and Josh Rudnik on second. Marsh and Rudnik each singled and then moved up 90 feet on a wild pitch before Bowder's base on balls.

The walk prompted Middle Georgia Head Coach Craig Young to remove Evan Jarman, MGC's third pitcher of the game, and replace him with Jarrett Leverett. Holloway greeted Leverett with the single that scored Marsh and extended his school-record hitting streak to 29 consecutive games.

Ethan Herron followed Holloway's hit with a two-run single that gave YHC reliever Steven Voigt some cushion when he went to the mound in the bottom of the 14th.

Voigt was the reason Holloway and Herron had the opportunity to produce in the 14th inning. After loading the bases with nobody out in the bottom of the 13th, Voigt retired the side by getting the next three batters to fly out without getting the ball deep enough into the outfield to produce a sacrifice fly.

Voigt (4-1), the third YHC pitcher used in the game, earned the victory with four shutout innings. He allowed two hits and three walks while striking out five batters.

Young Harris' first two runs came in the sixth on a two-run triple by Matt Lowery. A pair of solo home runs, from Jonathan Hester in the second inning and Chandler Hall in the sixth, accounted for Middle Georgia's scoring.

Brian Holmes, YHC's starter, went 6 and 1/3 innings and allowed two runs on six hits and one walk, while striking out seven batters. Adam Camara tossed 3 and 2/3 shutout innings. Camara allowed four hits and walked four batters. He struck out four batters.

Jarman took the loss, allowing three runs in 4 and 2/3 innings.

In the nightcap, the Mountain Lions' Brandon Cur-

son had three hits and Will Calaway drove in a pair of runs, but Middle Georgia College defeated Holloway and his Mountain Lion teammates 12-2 in the first game of a Georgia Junior College Athletic Association series.

Holloway's hit was a second-inning single, and was one of just seven hits on the day for the Mountain Lions. It came in the same inning as Curson's fifth home run of the year, a two-run shot that accounted for both of YHC's runs.

Brett Armour led Young Harris with two hits.

Middle Georgia's 12 runs came on 11 hits, with T. J. Rich, Jonathan Hester and Heine Rivera finishing with two hits each. Hester drove in a game-high four runs and Rich drove in three.

The game was stopped with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning due to the GJCAA's 10-run rule.

MGC's Zach Smith earned the win with a complete-game effort. He allowed two runs on seven hits and one walk while striking out nine batters.


Young Harris starter Ben Watson (3-1) took the loss. He allowed 10 runs (seven earned) on 10 hits and four walks. He struck out three batters.

Chad Hopkins came on in relief of Watson in the sixth. In 1.2 innings, Hopkins allowed two runs on one hit and four walks while striking out one batter.

Jesse Scott earned the victory for Middle Georgia, who received four RBIs from Chandler Hall and three from Heine Rivera.

Cosmic laser concerts contain loud music, flashing lights, spinning stars and other effects that some may find disruptive and are not recommended for those who may have conditions that could be aggravated by this experience.

Ranked third largest in Georgia by dome size, Rollins Planetarium features a state-of-the-art GOTO Chronos Space Simulator star projector with a state-of-the-art full-dome digital projection system, the Sky-Skan Definiti, in a 40-foot dome theater. In addition to a full annual schedule of evening public shows, it offers daytime educational opportunities for school groups throughout the year. Rollins Planetarium is located in the Maxwell Center on the campus of Young Harris College.

If skies are clear, the Young Harris College Observatory is open immediately after planetarium shows. The observatory features a Schmidt-Cassegrain telescope and is located about 1.5 miles from campus at Brasstown Valley Resort. Maps are available at the planetarium. Observing sessions last up to one hour and include a guided tour of the constellations. The observatory is open on the same dates as Rollins Planetarium.
