Patients with pre-existing conditions would be able to join pools with friends or groups and buy insurance or negotiate lower premiums.

"The President's plan forces you to choose from a list of plans that are only sanctioned by government bureaucrats," Congressman Broun said. "It also places mandates on businesses that will force them to lay off workers or change their employee coverage."

Congressman Broun's plan would make 100 percent of health care expenses tax deductible.

It also would reduce health care costs and removes burdensome government mandates and regulations.


"The President's plan increases taxes on small businesses and cuts Medicare benefits," he said.

Bottom line, he said that by forcing insurance companies to accept government mandates, it forces those companies to pass on those new costs to consumers in the form of higher premiums.

He insists the average family insurance premium will increase by \$2,100.

Congressman Broun also said that the executive order signed by President Obama to prevent the use of federal dollars for abortions is as worthless as the paper it's written on.

"A Presidential Executive order does not supersede law," he said. "The Health Care Reform legislation had already been signed into law when he signed the executive order. The President's legislation allows taxpayer money to fund abortions."

Towns County Middle School update

The following is our 2-person script that we wrote for our 7th grade science assignment from Mrs. Angela Medley, intern teacher with Mrs. Jennifer Moss, on Cnidarians. We were videotaped in our costumes as jellyfish by Michael Austin. We only had to start over 4 times.

"Both: This is a Glad Studio production.

Mia: Hi. I am Professor Mia. DD: Hi. I am Professor Danielle.

Mia: Today we will be teaching you about invertebrates.

Both: Cnidarians! which include Coral, Sea Anemones, some parasites, and (cut; get on costumes; resume tape) Jellyfish, which will be our main topic today.

Mia: The phylum Cnidarians contains over 9,500 species found in aquatic and marine environments. Cnidarians fire red harpoon like objects to capture and anchor in prey.

DD: They get food in many ways, like eating other organisms, absorbing dissolved decaying organisms, filtering food particles out of the water, and obtaining nutrients from symbiotic algae

within their cells. They swim in currents by using bells, or muscles, to propel them with the force of the water like a little propeller. They reproduce either sexually or asexually.

Mia: Jellyfish stings can kill people. On the other hand, some large jellyfish are considered a delicacy in Eastern and Southern Asia.

Coral reefs provide fishing grounds and a center of tourism. Some examples of

Jellyfish are Blue Button, By-the-wind Sailor, Cannonball, Man-of-War, Sea Nettle, and Moon Jelly. Jellyfish have been around for more than 650 million years, which means that they outdate both dinosaurs and sharks.

DD: Jellyfish are found in all of the worlds oceans. The largest jellyfish's tentacles can grow to be half the length of a football field.

Mia: That's all for today. Both: And remember don't get mad get Glad.
