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Diamond Indians struggles continue in Region 8

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The Towns County Indians' baseball teams' struggles continued last week.

On Tuesday, the Indians held a 2-0 lead over Athens Academy in a game that was called because of lightning in the area.

The Region 8 match was rescheduled for the following day. The results were exactly opposite, as the Spartans scored early and often as they defeated the Indians in three innings.

In the first official meeting of the year on March 6th, the Spartans topped the Indians 9-6 in a closely contested ball game.

Last week's setback leaves the Indians with a 1-12 record on the season, as prospects continued to look dim for the 2012 season.

The Indians have had some bright spots, junior Dillon Diehl has pitched admirably this season. With the growing pains of a youthful ball club, Coach Chris Vardo said his team is taking their season record in stride as they attempt to improve in all facets of

the game. Boone Moss has looked impressive at first base, as well as Luke Parker's progress had made great strides in 2012.

The pitching staff has had its struggles, but figures to improve with experience. The Indians only lose one senior following this season, that being Jake Mullins. Junior Bradley Smith also will be gone next season, as he enters college after the fall semester.

Payton Chambers has looked strong defensively in the outfield and has been coming around at the plate.

The Indians' match up with Commerce on Friday was washed out, leaving the team with a ton of make up games because of inclement weather.

The Indians were scheduled to play Lakeview Academy on Tuesday. Game results were not available at press time. They hit the road to Gainesville on Thursday to take on Riverside Military Academy. And on Friday, the Indians are at home against Athens Christian at 5 p.m. at Kimsy Stadium.



The Ladies, 5-5, 2-2 in conference, take on Highlands, NC on Tuesday and later in the week, face take on a talented Hebron Christian Team at home.

NASA Astrobiologist & Lunar Scientist Dr. Brad Bailey at YHC

On Thursday, April 12, Young Harris College's Division of Mathematics and Science will host "Life in the Universe, as Told by the Moon and Mars," a guest lecture by NASA astrobiologist and lunar scientist Brad Bailey, Ph.D., at 7 p.m. in Wilson Lecture Hall of Goolsby Center. The event is free and open to the public.

Dr. Bailey received his B.S. in physics with minors in optics, chemistry and Japanese from the Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology in Terre

Haute, IN, before earning his M.S. in astrophysics from the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, where he used the Very Large Array (VLA) to qualitatively analyze spectra from pulsars.

In 1998, Dr. Bailey was accepted into the NASA Ames Astrobiology Academy, an immersive summer research program for college students that provides direct contact with NASA researchers. After working for two years as a hardware engineer for the

International Space Station at NASA's Ames Research Center, Dr. Bailey earned his Ph.D. in marine microbiology and geochemistry from Scripps Institution of Oceanography in San Diego, CA.

Dr. Bailey currently serves as deputy director for the NASA Ames Academy for Space Exploration as well as a staff scientist at the NASA Lunar Science Institute.

Juried Art Exhibition at YHC's Campus Gate

Young Harris College's Campus Gate Art Gallery will host a Student Juried Art Exhibition featuring artwork by YHC students. The exhibit opens Thursday, April 12, with an opening reception at 6 p.m. in the Campus Gate Art Gallery. The exhibit will be on display through Friday, April 27. The reception and exhibit are free and open to the public.

All Young Harris College students are eligible to submit artwork created while enrolled in classes at the College to be juried for awards. Student artists awarded Best of Show, second place and third place will receive cash prizes. All awards will be presented at 6:30 p.m. during the opening reception.

The jurors for the show are illustrator Paula Joerling and kinetic artist Tom Haney, who presented an exhibition titled "Foundation to Fruition" at the Campus Gate Art Gallery in 2011.

Known for incorporating fabric, stitched paper and found objects into her artwork, Joerling finds ideas for her

mixed media pieces by scouring flea markets, antique stores and garage sales. Her illustrations, stitched paper collages and three-dimensional paper sculptures are often inspired by vintage items such as old department store catalogs, wallpaper sample books, costume jewelry and buttons.

Haney has been making mechanical pieces, or "automata," since 1994. Most of Haney's recent pieces have taken approximately 100-175 hours to complete. Along with creating the figures and mechanisms by hand, Haney often seeks out

and incorporates found objects that have a natural antique age and distress to them.
