
Ladies' playoff hopes still alive

United Community Bank's annual show benefits its communities



Duncan named editor of North Georgia News

Will oversee editorial operations in Towns and Union counties

Kenneth West, publisher of the Towns County Herald and North Georgia News, announced on Monday that Towns County Herald Editor Charles Duncan has been named editor of the North Georgia News in Blairsville.

Duncan, 51, has been editor of the Towns County Herald since October 2008. He will continue in that capacity in addition to his new duties with the North Georgia News.

Duncan replaces Norman Cooper who is now pursuing other professional opportunities, West said on Monday afternoon.

"I'm excited to have Charles Duncan at the North Georgia News," West said. "He's done a good job at the Towns County Herald. He's professional, he's experienced and he's trustworthy. He's done this job in other places and I feel he'll do right by Union County. He was raised here and understands the people who live here."

Duncan said he was honored to lead the Blairsville paper and humbled by West's confidence in him.

"I was born in Young Harris, I was raised in Blairsville," Duncan said. "I am a member of Union County High School's Class of 1978. I was Mr. School Spirit 1978 at Union County High.

"Of course I look forward to the opportunity to make the North Georgia News a progressive newspaper," Duncan said. "I also want to continue to keep it

Kendall asks GOP, Democrats to vote 'no'

Independents, Tea Party also asked to fight TSPLOST


There were no party lines on Thursday in Towns County.

In a unified effort to defeat a tax that takes food out of the mouths of families statewide, especially in Towns County, Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall spoke to Democrats, Republicans and Tea Party members.

He sought their support to defeat the 1-cent transportation tax that threatens to add a penny tax to food items, beverages, clothing items, home heating oil, electricity, all household goods and over-the-counter medicines over the next decade.

"Every time you go to the grocery store with a couple of hundred dollars worth of groceries in your buggy, you would pay an extra \$2 in taxes," Commissioner Kendall said. "Every time you fill up your 500-gallon propane tank to heat your home, you will pay an additional \$10-\$15 in sales tax."

The vote on the Transportation Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax comes July 31st, and exempts jet fuel, off-road diesel, motor fuel, locomotive fuel, mass transit fuel, the



Commissioner Bill Kendall sale or use of energy used in manufacturing. The tax also is levied on the first \$5,000 of any transaction involving the sale or lease of a motor vehicle.

If approved, it would take the local sales tax rate to 8 cents on the dollar.

Also, it would be the largest single-year tax increase in the history of the state of Georgia, coming in at an anticipated \$1.6 billion annually if approved statewide.
