## Tennis season comes to a close

The season for the Towns County Lady Indians' tennis team ended unceremoniously at Pace Academy on Thursday.

The Lady Indians fell to top seeded Pace Academy 3-0 during the first round of the Class A state playoffs.

For Towns County, it was their first appearance in the state playoffs.

"I can't tell you how proud I am of these young ladies," Coach Shannon Floyd said. "It was one and out, but it was a valuable experience to have reached the state playoffs. We're one of the very few public schools that made it this far. It was quite an achievement given the level of competition that we faced this season."

The Lady Indians finished the season with a 12-7 overall record. Three of those losses came during the post season, two in the Region 8-A tournament and one during the state playoffs.

The Lady Indians finished the regular season at 7-1 in region competition. Their lone loss at the hands of

Lakeview Academy may have been the reason their season ended so soon. Had they won that match, they could have avoided Pace Academy in the first round of the state playoffs.

"We learned a lesson that we'll always remember," Coach Floyd said. "Maybe that lesson will carry over into the season next year."

"We've got a ton of talent coming back next year," he said. "We're getting to that

point where teams are having to think about us being on their schedule."

The Lady Indians will carry lots of memories with them into next season, namely a 9-0 season start that put them in solid position within Region 8-A.

"We had our run," Coach Floyd said. "That's what we'll remember the most heading into next season's competition. We've got a real shot of getting back to the state playoffs next

Westminster Speedway stated they were taking their Friday running track off last week, but rumors have that it might have shut down for the season after only four races. It is a shame because it is really a nice facility; we can just hope they get things worked out.

Boyd's Speedway which runs on Friday nights did get their race in and Todd Hernandez won the Late Model feature, his first since moving up to that class.

Jonathan Davenport raced Friday night in the Lucas Oil Series 50 lapper at Bedford Speedway in Bedford, PA and out of the 66 cars entered, finished fifth.

Tri-County did get the go kart races in Friday night and several local youngsters did quite well.

This year's Prelude at Tony Stewart's Eldora Speedway in Ohio will feature 25 NASCAR drivers racing dirt Late Models to benefit four children's hospitals. In the past, the Prelude has raised close to three million dollars for charity. This year's event will be held June 9th and can be purchased with no commercial from Pay-Per-View for \$24.95.

The NHRA Southern Nationals will be held at Atlanta Dragway May 14-16. One of NHRA's long-established events, the race celebrates its 30th anniversary this season.

## Tribe drops a pair in region play

The Towns County Indians' diamond hopes have faded with a lackluster finish in Region 8-A play.

The Indians lost in three innings to Athens Academy by a score of 15-0. The loss left the Indians with an overall record of 6-13 and 3-11 in region play.

The offense just couldn't muster up a run, nor could it keep the Spartans' bats silenced.

Things began to look up as the state's No. 4 team, Hebron Christian came to town. By the second inning, the Indians had the Lions wondering just exactly who they were playing. The Indians jumped out on top 3-2 and had the Lions in defense mode.

Hebron Christian's fortunes changed and so did the scoreboard.

It wasn't long until the Lions were leading 18-5 after five innings. It wasn't pretty and it was the final score.

However, Coach Shannon Moss believes that the lumps served up to some hungry Indians hitters and pitchers this season will serve the team down the road.

We might not see that reflected on the scoreboard, but these young men will never forget the experiences they've picked up this season."

"They have a never say die attitude that beats within them and you'll never see this team throw in the towel," he said. "It's just not in their make up to do that."

The Indians played a late game in Andrews, NC. That score was not available at press time. On Tuesday, the Indians were slated to travel to Blue Ridge, NC to take on the Bobcats. The Indians have beaten both the Bobcats and the Wildcats in 2010.

On Thursday, the Indians travel to Hayesville to take on the Yellow Jackets and on Friday, they close out the season with Senior Night against the Tallulah Falls Indians. Game time: 5 p.m. Come out and support the Indians as they bring the 2010 season to a close.

### Third overtime is a charm for Harvick

For the first time in NASCAR history there were three attempts at a green-white-checkered finish in a Cup race, and Kevin Harvick came out the winner, Sunday at Talladega.

"Everything played out perfect of us today," said Harvick. "We had a plan to ride in the back until 50-laps to go and really push forward after that. It worked perfect."

Harvick was in the third spot at the beginning of the third and final restart. He made it to the rear of leader, Jamie McMurray's bumper and pushed him around the track until the third turn of the last lap, before giving McMurray a little sideways bump, causing McMurray to lose momentum.

Harvick then moved under McMurray's No. 1 and beat him to the finish by 0.012-seconds, or about a yard.

The win was the first Cup win for Harvick since the 2007 Daytona 500.

McMurray had the lead twice on green-white-checkered restarts when cars wrecked behind him.

The first time he was leading Greg Biffle and teammate Juan Pablo Montoya when Joey Logano got into the

back of Ryan Newman, collecting nine cars.

There were a total of 22 cars that were wrecked during the three green-white-checkered restarts.

Jeff Gordon was one of those. His teammate Jimmie Johnson forced him to go beyond the yellow line and he lost momentum. A few seconds later, Jeff Burton crashed into the outside wall and came down on Gordon.

"I don't know what happened, but I got collected," said Gordon. "We got a huge push down the back straightaway and I was running probably 10-miles an hour faster than the others."

"The 48 (Jimmie Johnson) is testing my patience. It takes a lot to make me mad and I am pi\*\*ed."

Gordon dropped from 5th to 10th in points.
