Cornwell case

GBI Public Affairs Director John Bankhead told *North Georgia News* that the GBI is investigating to see if there is some link between the late James Scott Carringer, 42, of Young Harris, and the disappearance of Kristi Cornwell. Cornwell has been missing since Aug. 11, 2009.

In April, Carringer killed himself inside a car in Buckhead. He was a suspect in the abduction and rape of a person he knew.

The GBI has not called Carringer a suspect or a person of interest in the Cornwell case. Carringer drove a silver Nissan Xterra prior to obtaining the black vehicle he had when he killed himself. A silver Nissan may have been involved in the Cornwell case. The GBI has been to Carringer's home, but did not say if they found any evidence.

"We don't know if there is any connection of not between James Scott Carringer and the disappearance of Kristi Cornwell," Bankhead said.

The website www.nganews.com will publish information from law enforcement agencies about this situation and the Cornwell case as it becomes available.

Ken Hamilton is a Towns County Indian, tried and true.

From the last time he pulled on his No. 25 Indians' jersey in 2001, to the last game he coached in February as interim head coach, Hamilton has thought of nothing but being the head basketball coach of his beloved Indians.

He'll get that chance after the Towns County Board of Education affirmed his selection Monday night as the Indians' head boys' basketball coach for 2010-11.

"This position has been Ken's goal," Towns County High School Principal Roy Perren said. "We interviewed several people for


David Ralston knows what it's like to walk the aisle at Young Harris College.

He accomplished that feat in 1974 and went on to earn a bachelor's degree at North Georgia College in Dahlonega and later, a law degree from the University of Georgia School of Law in Athens.

A burgeoning career in journalism gave way to a career law practice in his adopted home of Blue Ridge.

Ralston, born in Ellijay, where he graduated from Gilmer County High School, also had political aspirations.

In 1992, he was elected to the Georgia State Senate and served until 1998 when he won the Republican nomination for Attorney General. In 2002, Ralston was elected to the Georgia House of Representatives to serve the residents of House

District 7, which includes Fannin and Gilmer counties and part of Dawson.

On Jan. 11, in an historic moment in state legislative history, Ralston was chosen to lead the Georgia House of Representatives

as House Speaker, the chosen one to replace a disgraced and resigned House Speaker Glenn Richardson.

Ralston's path to the Gold Dome and one of the

County to buy park land

A piece of Towns County's heritage will be its future.

Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall told a crowd attending the annual Arts and Heritage Festival that the county will purchase land on Mining Gap Trail to preserve as green space and create a county park.

Surveys will soon take place, deeds will be drawn and sometime in July when the deal is done, the county will have between 45 and 55 acres, depending on the survey, Kendall said.

The property will be developed into athletic fields, walking trails and pavilions, similar to Meeks Park in neighboring Union County. Kendall also vows to use the land for the preservation of county green space.

The park's footprint is about the size of the Towns

County Comprehensive School campus, Kendall said.

"We'll soon have a county meeting to discuss all this and I want to encourage all of you to attend," he said. "The deed will read that this property will be a park in perpetuity so future leaders cannot change this."

Kendall said that overall development of the

Approximately 12,300 tomato plants given away at United Community Bank's annual Customer Appreciation Day last week could have a huge economic impact locally.

Those plants, with an anticipated yield of 34 tomatoes each, would yield 418,200 tomatoes. That translates into about 1.5 million 'mater' sandwiches. However, it's unclear how many quarts of mayonnaise and loaves of bread would be needed to complete the Appalachian delicacy.

One thing is for certain, UCB attracted a crowd at its Hiawassee branch on the day traditionally known as Arbor Day in Georgia.

"It was a great crowd," said Towns County native Reggie Shook. "It was a great day and it tickles me

to see everyone come out and enjoy themselves. Those tomato plants are really something else."

The bank shared food, fun and tomato plants with its customers. A tradition that set's the bank apart from its competition.

UCB Hiawassee CEO and President Rick Martin was amazed at the potential yield of the bright green tomato plants passed out to the thousands who attended Customer Appreciation Day.
