The Towns County Indians wish it was the start of the 2011 football season. The youthful Indians put it all together on this night and emerged from a battle with North Cobb Christian as the victor by a score of 33-6.

It was a night when everything clicked: offense, defense, special teams and of course, coaching.

Indians Head Football Coach Kyle Langford and his staff could do no wrong and the Indians celebrated Homecoming Night like it was the season opener.

Coach Langford was especially proud of the Indians' offensive line.

"The O-line has really worked hard," Coach Langford said. "They work hard all the time, but this

week they really worked hard on getting off the ball and being physical.

"I thought they were just that tonight - physical."

Wesley Bloodworth, recently reassigned to serve as the power back on offense, paid dividends early on, finding the end zone twice for touchdowns.

Sophomore quarterback Jackson Noblet rushed for two scores and senior tailback Noah Calhoun rambled 80 yards for a touchdown as the Indians made it two in a row on Homecoming Night.

"Defensively, everyone was getting to their right spots getting the hats on hats," Coach Langford said. "That's what I was most pleased with; I thought the secondary played well, they did a very good job tonight also."

## Austin, Wilkinson qualify for Senate District 50

Early voting begins Oct. 17 for State Senate seat

The race to fill the unexpired term of Jim Butterworth in the District 50 Senate seat began in earnest on Monday.

Rick Austin, the former state representative from District 10 and John Wilkinson, the former program manager for the agricultural education program in Georgia and State FFA Advisor, have both qualified to run for the District 50 State Senate vacancy.

Butterworth accepted the post of adjutant general of the Georgia National Guard early last month. He assumed his duties as Gen. Jim Butterworth on Sunday.

Whether or not Austin and Wilkinson have competition for voters in Banks, Franklin, Habersham, Hart, Rabun, Stephens and Towns counties and a portion of White County remains to be seen.

Qualifying continues through Wednesday at noon in Atlanta.

Both Austin and Wilkinson were in Hiwassee last month to announce their candidacy for Senate District 50 during the September Towns County Republican Party meeting at Daniel's Steakhouse in Hiwassee.

Austin was raised on a small farm in Habersham County. He graduated from Piedmont College in 1990 with a Bachelor of Science

in Biology. He earned his Masters degree from Auburn University in 1993 and his Ph.D. from the University of Mississippi in 1997. Currently, Austin is a Biology professor at Piedmont College in Demorest.

He stepped down as Georgia House District 10 state representative to seek the seat left vacant by Butterworth.
