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Homecoming was sweet for the Towns County Indians' football team

The 2011 Indians and their fans have had little to cheer about this season.

Friday night Indians' Head Coach Kyle Langford and his crew looked to start anew on Homecoming night.

The Indians finally put it all together as they sent the North Cobb Christians Eagles packing back to Kennesaw with a 33-6 loss under their belts.

Junior running back Wesley Bloodworth scored twice, sophomore quarterback Jackson Noblet scored twice and senior Noah Calhoun rambled 80 yards for a score to lead the Indians to the decisive Homecoming win at Frank McClure Stadium.

From the opening kickoff the Indians appeared determined to defend the home turf.

On the opening Indian drive, sophomore quarterback Jackson Noblet hit newly appointed running back, junior Wesley Bloodworth, for a huge gain to break the ice for the Indians offense.

Bloodworth capped the opening drive with a 3-yard plunge giving the Indians an early 6-0 advantage. The Indians maintained the 6-0 lead throughout the first quarter.

Midway through the

second quarter senior running back Noah Calhoun galloped through the heart of the Eagles' defense en route to an 80-yard score giving the Indians a 12-0 lead.


Later in the quarter it was Bloodworth again finding the end zone from 3 yards out giving the Indians a 19-0 advantage as the half came to a close.

Taking the second half kickoff, the Eagles mounted a shutout threatening opening drive, but were denied on a fourth and goal from the 7-yard line on a big Indians defensive stand.

The Indians offense would sustain the momentum with a 93-yard drive capped by a Noblet touchdown run as he scrambled into the end zone from eight yards out giving the Indians a commanding 26-0 lead with just over 2 minutes to go in the third quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter, Noblet would find the end zone again scoring on a 31-yard touchdown run and giving the Indians a decisive 33-0 spread.

The Indians would lose the Homecoming shutout on a late would-be interception that slipped right through the defender's hands into the out-

stretched arms of Eagles' wide receiver Corey Harris for a touchdown reception.

That was the last time the Eagles would find the end zone as the Indians defense managed to preserve the 27-point victory 33-6.

The Indians have a bye week on Friday. They'll spend the week in preparation for a trip to Woodstock where they'll take on the River Ridge Knights at 7:30 p.m. on Oct. 14. The Indians topped the Knights last season by a score of 14-7.

The Indians' 8-year-old squad won for the sixth consecutive time as they wore out the Fannin County Rebels by a convincing score of 40-7.

The Indians were led Saturday morning by Payton Ivester's 205 rushing yards and five scores as the Tiny Mites trounced the Rebels.

The Tiny Mites are now 6-0 on the season.

Kyle Oakes added had 25 rushing yards and a touchdown run; and Hayden McClure rushed for 75 yards in the Saturday morning romp.

On defense, McClure registered 12 tackles, while Ivester, Clayton Gibson, Kyle and Garrett Oakes each had five tackles.
