Political newcomer Miller takes Young Harris Council Seat

The City of Young Harris' Post 3 Council Seat is in new hands.

Stuart Miller, director of Residence Life at Young Harris College and a political newcomer, has been declared the winner following verification of provisional ballots by the Towns County Board of Elections.

Miller had exactly 50 percent of the vote at the end of the Nov. 8 General Election, garnering 63 votes to Deborah Edwards' 33 and Incumbent Jennifer Mulkey's 30.

However, five provisional ballots held the answers to whether Miller would win the election out-

right or face a runoff with Edwards or Mulkey.

Upon further review of the provisional ballots, only three were deemed valid ballots. Miller took two of the three, giving him 50.39 percent of the vote. The Elections Board declared

Austin thanks Towns residents for support

Senate front-runner Austin urges locals to vote Dec. 6th

District 50 Senate hopeful Rick Austin could have been in Hall County at a political fundraiser on Thursday night.

Instead, the Demorest Republican vying for the District 50 State Senate seat was in Towns County, shaking hands and thanking voters for their support on Nov. 8.

Austin and challenger John Wilkinson will face each other on Dec. 6 in a runoff for the District 50 Senate Seat.

Austin first arrived at Daniels Steakhouse, the scene of the Marine Corps 236th birthday.

He thanked veterans, not for their votes, but for their dedicated service to their country. One-by-one, he walked through the dining room shaking hands and patting each veteran on the back.

Later, he attended the Monthly Meeting of Towns

County Republicans at the Towns County Senior Center near the Courthouse.

"The last seven weeks have been a whirlwind," said Austin, who seeks to fill the unexpired term of Jim Butterworth. "I started off my day in Demorest teaching two classes in a laboratory. I went from there to Franklin County and then I turned around and drove up here.

Kendall to finalize budget, millage Public hearing set for 5:30 p.m. Thursday at Courthouse

Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall will adopt the 2012 Fiscal Budget and millage rate on Thursday at 5:30 p.m. at the Towns County Courthouse.

Last month, Commissioner Kendall tentatively adopted the \$9.38 million budget and the 2012 millage rate of 5.320 mills for maintenance and operation and .470 mills for the Fire & Rescue operations.

The 2012 budget is virtually the same amount as the 2011 Fiscal Budget, county records show.

The projected budget includes \$1.12 million for the Towns County Sheriff's Of-

ice, \$912,000 for Jail Operations, \$1 million plus for Towns County Ambulance Services, \$930,700 for the County Road Department, \$294,000 for the Recreation Department and \$370,000 for Fire Services.

Commissioner Kendall said he was able to cut the proposed millage rate by realizing savings in several areas, including negotiating a Point of Service

agreement for county employees' health insurance.

Health insurance premium costs were projected to climb 36 percent, but with the new POS agreement, actual premiums declined by 15 percent.

The county also reduced spending through personnel attrition in the Towns County Recreation Department; the Towns County Board of Health agreed to split one of the full-time positions in Environmental Health with Union County to account for additional savings.

"Because of a number of state budget cuts to their portion of Health Department funding the Health

Williams details new curriculum for schools

The schools chief for Towns County Schools says that the state-mandated Georgia Performance Standards will become the system's new curriculum beginning next year.

Superintendent Melissa Williams spoke to the Towns County Republicans last week at the Towns County Senior Center and shared plans for implementing a new life skills-based instruction for student's kindergarten through 12th grade.

"Georgia has joined with 44 other states to standardize a core curriculum framework that will provide consistent, rigorous knowledge of skills that will prepare all of our students, kindergarten through 12th grade for college and the 21st Century workplace," she said.

"We're really looking at what I would consider a nationally-based curriculum," she said. "Georgia has taken the lead on the development of this common core."

Bottom line: Georgia is taking their Georgia Performance Standard nationally.

"It shifts from a curriculum that was an inch deep to a mile long, to some-

thing that was a little more substantial and intact, short, compact and goes into much more detail," she said. "Georgia has taken their Georgia Performance Standard to other states; we are building a new national curriculum."

Williams said Towns County will begin introducing the new curriculum next year in math and English Language Arts.

"We will eventually add science and social studies," she said. "The focus of this new curriculum is to add a high level of thinking skills for our students."

It also is to give more
