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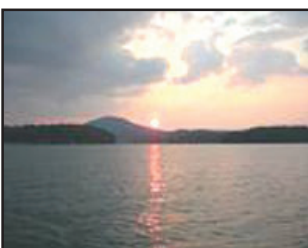

Tax bills in the mail on Nov. 30th, Rogers says

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Towns County residents will soon see their new tax bills in the mail.

Towns County Tax Commissioner Bruce Rogers told county residents last week that tax bills will be in the mail by Nov. 30th.

The bills likely will be cheaper than last year as decreased fair market values continue to eat away at the Towns County Tax Digest.

Rogers added that there are a lot of good people struggling right now to pay their taxes in this unpredictable economy.

"We understand that," he said. "Commissioner (Bill) Kendall lowered the county millage rate by a quarter mill. That will make a difference on these tax bills."

Rogers said that county residents who pay their taxes before Dec. 30 can claim them on their 2011

tax returns.

"By law you've got 60 days to pay your property taxes, but you don't have to wait that long," he said. "A lot of folks like to pay them before the end of the year and claim them on their tax returns."

Rogers' comments came on the heels of Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall's approval of the 2011 millage rate at 5.320 mills, down slightly from last year's rate of 5.570 mills.

A mill is \$1 for every \$1,000 of assessed property tax. Towns County assesses property at 40 percent of its value.

Dec. 6th Senate runoff nears

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It's been one of the shortest election processes in Georgia history.

But at the end of the business day on Dec. 6th, there will be a new District 50 State Senator.

Qualifying for the seat left vacant when Jim Butterworth became Major Gen. Butterworth of the Georgia National Guard began on Oct. 3rd. In three days, five candidates lined up for a shot to become the eight-county Senate district's next representative.

On Nov. 8th, only two candidates made the final cut for the Dec. 6th runoff: Rick Austin and John Wilkinson.

Austin, of Demorest, is the former state representative from Georgia House District 10. He resigned that post to run for State Senate. Terry Rogers, of Habersham County was elected to fill his unexpired term on Nov. 8.

Austin is a biology professor at Piedmont College in Demorest and former Habersham County commissioner.

Wilkinson, of Toccoa,

2012 budget \$20 less than 2011

Watchful eye, smart shopping save taxpayers dollars

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It's funny how things work out.

At a time when most local governments are raising taxes for their residents, Towns County taxpayers will experience tax relief.

As the county Tax Digest continues to regress, Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall lowered the county's millage rate by .25 mills to 5.320 mills. He also set the Fire Tax at .470 mills for the Fire & Rescue operations.

The current Tax Digest depreciated by more than \$607,000. The quarter mill cut by Commissioner Kendall decreased tax rev-

enues by another \$204,000. Overall, the \$9.38 million budget approved last week by Commissioner Kendall is \$20 less next year than in 2011.

"It's a good budget; it's balanced and it comes at a time when people all over the county are having trouble," Commissioner Kendall said. "The foreclosures are really hurting our Tax Digest."

Foreclosed properties are selling for pennies on the dollar and when a foreclosed property sells, the selling price, according to Georgia law, is the new assessed value of the property.

The approved budget includes \$1.12 million for the Towns County Sheriff's Office, \$912,000 for Jail Operations, \$1 million plus for Towns County Ambulance Services, \$930,700 for the County Road Department, \$294,000 for the Recreation Department and \$370,000 for Fire Services.

Commissioner Kendall said he was able to cut the millage rate by realizing savings in several ar-

YHC one step closer to NCAA Division II

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The Young Harris College Board of Trustees has approved the addition of intercollegiate men's and women's lacrosse and competitive cheerleading to the athletics programs at Young Harris College beginning in the fall of 2012.

Young Harris College currently sponsors 12 intercollegiate sports teams: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball and men's and women's tennis.

The addition of more competitive sports comes on the heels of news that YHC has been formally accepted as a candidate for membership in the NCAA at the Division II level.

"We are very excited to begin the formal process to full membership in NCAA at the Division II level," YHC President Cathy Cox said in a release last week. "Our athletic department has worked diligently in leading this endeavor, and this achievement is a significant milestone in our on-going transformation to a four-year college. We know that

NCAA membership will attract many talented student-athletes to Young Harris College."

YHC Athletics Director Randy Dunn agreed.

"Today is a great day for YHC," Dunn said. "I am very pleased that the NCAA membership committee considered YHC a worthy institution for provisional membership. Obtaining full membership will be a three-year process, and if everything goes well, YHC should receive full NCAA membership in 2014-2015."

During the first provisional year, YHC will bring
