### **'Old Man Winter' arrives early**

It's time to start believing the weatherman: it is cold outside.

Of course anyone with an outside thermometer can tell that. Heck, just walk outside in a T-Shirt and you'll quickly find yourself heading back indoors to the nearest heat source.

And no one will doubt it when they hear the weatherman predict snow is in the forecast for early next week. The National Weather Service predicts a 60 percent chance of snow on Sunday and a 30 percent chance on Monday.

By midnight Tuesday, with the wind chill factor included, the real feel temperature in Towns County was 7 degrees according to the National Weather Service.

The culprit behind the Arctic Blast of cold weather, an Alberta Clipper, bringing unseasonable cold temperatures to the Southeast and bringing Christmas cheer to the fuel and utility companies.

The forecast for the rest of the week is encouraging. The prevalent winds that have made temperatures feel 10-15 degrees colder than they actually are, will subside, according to the National Weather Service.

High temperatures are expected to peak on Friday at 50 degrees, with lows feeling like the upper teens
