At the end of one year, those subscribers can renew at a rate of \$15.



2010 brings economic hope

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As the clock ticked down on 2009, the economic hope of 2010 began to take shape.

During the last scheduled meeting of 2009, City of Hiwassee Mayor Barbara Mathis announced that as many as 50 new jobs were headed this way. The Baptist Retirement Association of Georgia had just closed on 23 acres near Towns County Schools to build a 120-unit retirement facility.

The facility not only brings 45-50 new jobs, but also brings numerous construction jobs while the facility is being built. Once built, it brings 120 new residents with buying power.

While 2010 was supposed to be the August debut of Lowe's Home Im-

2009 almost in the history books

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A new city councilman in Hiwassee, an historic tax break, a family tragedy and a proposed commercial development put on ice dominated the headlines in 2009.

While the year is almost gone, it's appropriate to take a look back at the year that was and track the notable news stories.

On election night, Nov. 4th, Towns County registered voters decided to give themselves a tax break. When it was all said and done, 1,899 Towns County voters came to the local polls. Of those totals, 1,806 supported an amendment that Towns County homeowners with local exemptions the only county in Georgia with a \$10,000 tax break. Only 52 voters didn't want a tax break. The vote increases

the local exemption from \$2,000 allowed by the state to \$10,000 only in Towns County. The break takes effect Jan. 1.

In January, Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall announced the effort to make Towns County the only one of Georgia's 159 counties to get the extra \$8,000 for local homestead exemptions that had been eliminated by the Georgia General Assembly.

In February, the Towns County Lady Indians advanced to the state playoffs again. They didn't make it to the Final Four, but made Towns County proud in a spirited run at a Class A state title. Also, Indians' wrestler Timmy Collier fought his way through a crowded pack of wrestlers to earn the fourth place

Called County meeting on Jan. 4

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Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall is seeking sealed bids for interest rates on Towns County General funds.

The sealed bids will be opened at a special County Meeting on Jan. 4, at 2 p.m. in the Towns County

Commissioner's Office, in the Courthouse, in Downtown Hiwassee.

Bids requested are as follows include fixed interest rates (APY) on three, \$500,000 Certificates of Deposit, beginning approximately on Jan. 5 for a term of 12 months. Bid forms will be provided.

Commissioner Kendall said that the county

reserves the right of automatic renewal of the Certificates of Deposit with the winning bidder for one renewal term, if so desired.

Towns County also reserves the right to reject any or all bids for any reason.

Sealed bids should either be brought to the Jan. 4 special meeting, or mailed to the Commission Office.

Sheriff urges fire safety

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Towns County Sheriff Chris Clinton urges Towns County residents to adopt a personal fire safety plan for 2010 in the wake of the Dec. 7 tragedy on Scataway Road.

"Recently, a family in Towns County lost two loved ones due to a house fire," he said. "This type of tragedy occurs far too often. There are some things that you can do to help keep yourself and your family safer."

Sheriff Clinton urges the installation and maintenance of smoke detectors in each home.

"Smoke detectors can save your life, but only if they are in good working order," he said. "Maintain and test smoke detectors regularly and never remove the batteries for other uses."

Another safety tip: if a smoke detector sounds while you are sleeping, roll to the floor and crawl, Sheriff Clinton said.

"If you encounter smoke, remember the best air will be closest to the floor," he said.

The sheriff asks residents to be sure to give heaters and fireplaces plenty of space.

"Placing combustible material close to a heat source can cause it to ignite and start a fire," he said.

The sheriff also urges families to adopt an escape plan in the event of a fire.

"A good plan should include two escape routes from any room in the home," he said. "You should designate a place to meet outside. Once out of the fire, stay out."

If your clothes are on fire, "stop, drop, and roll!" Sheriff Clinton said.

"By now most of you have heard of this. If your clothing catches fire, stop, drop to the ground, and roll," he said. "This is the best way to smother the flames. It is a good idea to cover your face with your hands to protect your face and lungs from smoke and flames."

"You should practice this plan with your family so that everyone is familiar with it," Sheriff Clinton said.
