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Lady Indians lose competitive games to Polk, Hayesville, defeat Walhalla

Although competing quite well in all three games played in the Battle of the States Tournament last week, the Towns County Lady Indians fell to defeat by six and seven points margins in their first two games to quality opponents in Polk County (Tennessee) and Hayesville before taking a hard fought 56-54 victory in the final seconds over Walhalla (South Carolina) for seventh place in the third round on Saturday.

The Lady Indians completed the week's play with a 4-7 overall record as they begin the 2020 portion of their schedule by hosting Region 8-A foe Providence Christian Academy of Lilburn on Friday, travel to Hayesville on Saturday, and return home to host non region opponent Rabun Gap on Tuesday.

Polk County 53, Lady Indians 47 – The Polk County Lady Wildcats entered the Battle of the States and their game with the Lady Indians with an impressive 6-2 record with not much information about the games they have played being available other than the games played in the tournament.

It required just under three minutes for the Lady Indians to strike for a 9-0 lead over the Lady Wildcats on two coast to coast runs for deuces by junior Kennedi Henson, a trey by junior Vanessa Floyd, and a drive for a deuce by senior Sophia Shook. A pair of treys by Polk got them to within 9-6 by the 2:44 mark of the first quarter but three deuces by Floyd for a 6-1 Lady Indians finish had them leading 15-7 at quarter's end.

Points would be hard to come by for the Lady Indians for an extended time after that, however, as the Lady Cats outscored the Lady Indians 14-5 in the second quarter for a 21-20 lead at intermission and they continued on for a 29-24 lead by the 6:03 mark of the second

Drives for deuces by Shook and Henson sandwiched around two Polk free throws had the Lady Indians within 31-28 at 4:44 of the third quarter and they responded to an ensuing 7-0 run by the Lady Cats with a 7-1 finish the final 1:45 the fourth quarter. fourth quarter by Polk for a 45-37 advantage at the 5:31 mark, two free throws and a field goal by Floyd had the Lady Indians still well within striking distance in trailing just 45-41 at 4:03 but the Lady Cats used 6-for-7 free throw shooting during an 8-2 run for a 53-43 lead at 42.7 before a trey and free throw by Henson reduced the final Polk margin of victory to 53-47. and was followed by Henson and were very impressive in to be decisive for a 39-28 lead with 16 and Shook with 10 while junior Jayce Young led in assists with 2. Leaders in rebounds were Floyd with 9 and Henson with 8 as Floyd also led in steals with 4 and Henson was right behind with 3.

Cats were led in scoring by sophomore Courtney Farr with 18 points, junior Kailey Cox with 13, and freshman Callie Brewer with 11. The Lady Cats followed the same pattern of quickly falling behind in their second round game against Hokes' Bluff (Alabama), trailing 10-0 until sinking two free throws in the final seconds of the first quarter and not sinking their first field goal until near the mid point of the second.

The Lady Indians took The very youthful Lady a 3-2 lead on a trey by junior Kennedi Henson at the 5:10 mark of the first quarter and got within 8-5 on two free throws by Henson at 3:12 but the Lady Jackets struck for the final seven points of the quarter for a 17-5 lead at quarter's end.

The Lady Indians edged to within 23-16 at the 19-second mark of the second quarter behind six points by Henson before the Lady Jackets sank a trey as time expired for a 26-16 lead at intermission. Floyd included a trey among seven of nine Lady Indian points in third quarter action as they closed to within 31-25 entering the fourth quarter.

A putback basket by freshman Sarah Shook got the Lady Indians within 31-27 at the 6:21 mark of the fourth quarter before a mystifying official's call of five seconds on court with three seconds rules applying in the lane under the basket where Henson arrived just an instant prior to the questionable call. Although no one could ever know if Henson would have reduced the lead without what seems certain to have been a misapplication of the rules, it is a fact that the resultand score was the start of a 7-2 at 2:59. Beginning at the 2:42 mark, the Lady Indians struck for four treys-one each by junior Jayce Young and senior Sophia Shook and two by Henson-in a 14-10 game ending run and a 49-42 Hayesville victory.

A Walhalla deuce and free throw prior to and a trey following a Henson basket gave the Indians another challenge with Walhalla holding a 54-50 lead at 3:19 but a deuce by Henson at 2:56 and one by Sarah Shook following a missed free throw attempt by Walhalla at 1:34 got the Lady Indians a tie again at 54-54.

With the Lady Indians holding possession at 33.3 seconds and the tie still in effect, they went for one shot and Henson was fouled on a drive to the basket at 2.6 seconds. She sank both free throws for a 56-54 lead and a desperation field goal attempt by Walhalla from mid court missed the mark with the Lady Indians claiming the two point victory.

The Lady Indians were led in scoring by Henson with 26 points, Floyd with 11, Sarah Shook with 10, and Sophia Shook with 6 while leaders in assists were Sophia Shook with on with 4, and Floyd with 3. Henson and Sophia Shook led in rebounds with 5 each and Floyd and Young followed with 4 each while leaders in steals were Sarah Shook with 5 and Henson and Sophia Shook with 4 each. 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The Lady Indians got very little resistance from the Lady Cats as they vaulted out to a 30-2 lead by the 1:34 mark of the second quarter, leading 17-2, 32-7, and 43-17 at the quarter breaks in taking a 57-29 triumph. The Lady Cats saw their record fall to 1-6 with the loss while the Lady Indians improved their record to 3-4 with the victory.

After finishing the game on a 14-0 run for a 52-39 win at Hiwassee Dam last month, the Lady Indians fell into a big hole in the opening minutes of this game, trailing 19-4 by the 5:53 mark of the second quarter, rallying heroically to within 31-29 by the 5:47 mark of the fourth quarter but going cold after that and unable to quite get over the early game deficit and falling by a 44-33 score

Lady Indians 57, Andrews 29 – It required more than three and a half minutes of playing time for the Lady Indians to begin to take control of their game after a field goal by junior Vanessa Floyd got them a 2-0 lead at the 5:47 mark of the first quarter. It was nearly all Lady Indians from the 4:27 mark of the first quarter to the 1:34 mark of the second when they used a 28-2 run for the aforementioned 30-2 lead

The Lady Indians' shooting went cold after that, however, and the Lady Eagles struck for three deuces for a 37-29 lead at 2:40 and they sank 7-of-10 free throws the remainder of the game compared to two free throws by Sophia Shook and a deuce by Floyd in closing out the 44-33 victory.

Scoring leaders for the game for the Lady Indians were Floyd and Henson with 11 points each and Sophia Shook with 5 with Shook leading in assists and steals with 3 of each and Floyd and Henson leading in rebounds with 7 each. The Lady Eagles were led in scoring by Chloe Roe with 15 points and Kiare Anderson with 10. This was their second victory in a row as they completed the week's play with a 2-5 record.
