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Page to retire as elementary school principal after 33-year career

Towns County Elementary School Principal Dr. Sandy Page will retire at the end of the 2019-2020 school year following 33 years of serving students as an educator. The announcement came during the Feb. 11 Board of Education meeting at the schools.

Page has spent the last eight years of her career as elementary school principal, and she said leaving will definitely be a bittersweet occasion.

"I'm excited and looking forward to my new journey, but I'm really going to miss the children and getting to see them every day," Page said.

"This is a great staff and a great school, and I'm going to really miss it."

Page aspired to be in education as far back as she can remember, she said. Before accepting a position as Towns County Elementary School assistant principal in 2003, she worked in the White County School District for 17 years.

"I just knew I always wanted to work with children," Page said. "I always enjoyed school and learning, and I wanted to share my passion for education with children."

Looking back over her many years at Towns County Elementary, Page said it's easy to see why the school has been such a success, thanks in large part to all the great teachers who have provided a

fun learning environment that makes students eager to learn.

As the school's leader, Page said it's important for the students, parents and staff to see her every day, which will certainly make it that much more of a bittersweet occasion when she leaves.

She loves her school and students, Page said, noting that every morning, as parent's pull through the student drop-off, she is always standing there to greet the children.

Of course, being a principal is a tough job that comes with its own particular challenges as well, Page said, though she has immensely enjoyed her time at Towns County Elementary.

"I truly love working with the students and teachers

at Towns County Schools, and most of all, I am going to miss seeing the smiling faces of my students each day," Page said.

Regarding next steps for the longtime educator, she

said she's ready to embrace all that being retired has to offer, including travel and family time.

"I have been working in education for 33 years now; both my boys are married and starting their own families," Page said. "I am ready to spend time with my family and enjoy retirement."

The school board approved Page's resignation in the Feb. 11 meeting, to be effective at the close of the current school year.

Board members, along with Middle School Principal Dr. Connie Hobbs and Superintendent Dr. Darren Berrong, expressed how much they will miss her at Towns County Schools, and Page received a standing ovation

from the board and her peers during the meeting that Tuesday night.

"I am so thankful to have had the opportunity to work for Towns County Elementary," Page said. "Towns County Elementary School is a fantastic school with so many great people, from the students to the staff and the parents."

Berrong said that Page has been a great asset to the school system, adding that everyone is very thankful for all she has done for Towns County Schools.

The board office is currently working to fill Page's position for next school year, and an announcement regarding specific next steps will be made in a future board meeting.

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Early voting begins March 2, runs through Friday, March 20

Three weeks of early voting for the March 24 Presidential Preference Primary will begin on Monday, March 2.

Every weekday between March 2 and March 20, during the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., registered Towns County voters will be able to cast their votes at the Towns County Board of Elections & Registration Office next to the courthouse, even during lunchtime.

Voters who find themselves too busy to vote during the scheduled weekdays will be able to take advantage of one weekend day of early in-person voting on Saturday, March 14, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the courthouse, and also during lunchtime.

As this is a primary, voters will need to declare a political party to receive a ballot, though voters will be able to declare a different political party when voting in

the May 19 General Primary Election.

Election Day for the Presidential Preference Primary, in which voters will be selecting a presidential candidate to lead their party of choice, will be on Tuesday, March 24, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. That day, voters should report to one of the three pre-assigned Towns County precincts.

Registered voters who will be at least 18 years of age by Election Day will be

eligible to vote during early voting, and Monday, Feb. 24, is the registration deadline for voters looking to participate in the Presidential Preference Primary.

For information on applying for an absentee ballot, visit the Georgia Secretary of State's Office website at sos.ga.gov; swing by the Towns County Board of Elections & Registration Office at 67 Lakeview Circle, Suite A, in Hiwassee; or call 706-896-4353.

Demonstrations of the new voting equipment being used in this year's elections are no longer being held, as the board office is busy preparing equipment for early voting, though instructions for using the new equipment will be available during early voting and on Election Day.
