On Friday Feb. 7, the boys took on Washington-Wilkes and in a tightly contested game they won 63-50.

The Lady Indians season came to a close following a 54-41 loss to Greene County in the first-round of the Region 8-A tournament.

In the boys win over Washington Wilkes, the Indians trailed by a point at the end of the first, but Towns was able to rebound and go into halftime with a 7-point lead. The teams traded the lead several times, but in the end, Towns scored 26 points in the fourth quarter. The win allowed the Indians to advance to the state playoffs for the sixth year in a row.
