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## Two impressive victories propel Indians into Elite 8

Final Four spot up for grabs Tuesday when Towns visits No. 3 Irwin County

The fourth-ranked Towns County Indians varsity basketball team took impressive home court victories over Manchester and Warren County last week in the first two rounds of the Class A Public State Tournament, qualifying for the Elite Eight round this week.

They got to the Sweet 16 on Tuesday by taking a 78-67 win over Manchester and to the Elite 8 round on Saturday with a 77-67 vic-tory over Warren County of Warrenton.

With the two wins, the Indians are set to travel on Tuesday of this week to Irwin County High School in Ocilla, about twenty miles northeast of Tifton, for a third round state tournament game at 5 pm.

A coin toss at the state level brought about the Indians having to travel to Irwin County as each team was seeded number one from their region.

The Indians came quite close to hosting Mitchell County this week instead of the trip to Ocilla as Mitchell County as the number three seed from their region lost by just a 69-66 score on Irwin's home court and the Indians would have had seeding rights over Mitchell if they had been the winner.

The winner of the game between the Indians and Irwin County will reach the final four round of the state tournament on Friday or Saturday of this week against the winner of a game between Chattahoochee County and Portal with the day and time to be determined and there will be another coin toss for hosting as both of those teams are top seeds from their

The Indians completed the week with a 22-3 record, including 11-1 in regular season Region 8-A Public play, and ranked fourth in the state by the Atlanta Journal and Constitution.

The fourth quarter would see the Indians able to answer every challenge issued by Warren County, largely at the foul line as the Devils used the long used tactic of fouling, hoping for enough misses and in this case overmatching two free throws with treys on four occasions in the closing minutes.

Red hot free throw shooting from the first quarter forward saw the Indians sink 25 straight free throws between the 51.4 seconds mark of the first quarter and the 25.0 seconds mark of the fourth before sinking two of four during the final 17.3 seconds in taking a 77-67 victory

The Indians led by as many as twelve points on two occasions and by as few as seven on three in the fourth quarter.

After sinking five treys in less than three and a half minutes of playing time between the 2:05 mark of the first quarter and 6:43 of the second, the Devils had cooled off by sinking just two more before sinking four in the final 2:55 of the game with the accurate free throw shooting by the Indians a necessity for their taking the victory.
