Lady Indians win at Talbotton, season ends with competitive loss at GMC

The Towns County Lady Indians varsity basketball team hit the road last week for games at Talbotton in west central Georgia near Columbus and Milledgeville in central Georgia near Macon and got a split decision. As the third seeded team from Region 8A Public, the Lady Indians got a 45-37 victory over Central of Talbotton, the second seeded team from Region 5A Public on Tuesday. They then led for most of the first three quarters but fell by a 53-44 score to top ten ranked Georgia Military College, the top seeded team in Region 7A Public in a game which was not put out of reach by the winners until the final 1:20 of the game.

The Lady Indians completed their season with a 12-13 record against a most formidable schedule as described in articles throughout the season.

There are many points which could be made in describing the challenging schedule but perhaps the most informative may be that twelve of the Lady Indians' losses came against eight teams which all won 16 or more games, including a current 25-0 record by Lake Oconee Academy, the top ranked Class A Public team in the state and the champion of the Lady Indians' Region

All eight teams of course reached the state tournament and three of the eight have qualified for the Elite Eight in their classification and another reached the Sweet 16 in state competition.

Lady Indians 45, Central of Talbotton 37 Sophomore Sarah Shook opened the scoring in this game with a steal and a coast to coast run for a field goal at the 7:11 mark of the first quarter for a 2-0 lead the Indians would not

The game would be marked by challenges by the Lady Tigers of Central of Talbotton and answers by the Lady Indians who, it might be said, bent but didn't break with key shots and defensive

The Lady Indians methodically built leads by scores such as 5-0, 10-3, 13-6, and 17-10 in first quarter action but with two free throws getting the Lady Hawks within 17-12 at quarter's end.

Senior Kennedi Henson led the first quarter excellence by including a trey, a deuce, and 3-for-4 free throw shooting among 8 points with senior Vanessa Floyd contributing four points on two deuces and freshman Laura Mauldin three points on a putback basket and a free throw.

A putback basket by Central at the 7:27 mark of the second quarter got them within 17-14 but the Lady Indians used a trey by Shook and a deuce and trey by Henson in an 8-3 run for a 25-17 lead by the midpoint of the second quarter with the



appearance of taking control of the game.

That would not be the case at this time, however, as both teams went more than four minutes from their previous points without scoring until the Lady Hawks sank two treys during the final 1:06 of the quarter for just a 25-23 deficit at

A Henson trey just twenty four seconds into the third quarter got the Lady Indians ahead 28-23 but it required a trey by Floyd at the 3:34 mark to get a 32-27 Towns lead which became 38-27 on three for four free throw shooting by Henson and a trey by Shook with the Lady Indians lead being 39-29 entering the fourth

Henson led the Lady Indians in scoring with 21 points and was followed by Shook with 11, Floyd with 7, and freshman Laura Mauldin and senior Jayce Young with 3 each while leaders in assists were Henson with 4 and Floyd and senior Abby Mauldin with 2 each.

Leaders in rebounds were Henson with 8, Floyd with 7, Laura Mauldin with 4, and Abby Mauldin with 3 while leaders in steals were Henson with 3 and Floyd and Young with 2 each.

Central of Talbotton were senior Ty'Shemia Bunkley with 17 points, sophomore Alayla Sparks with 9, and junior Renijua Johnson with

The Lady Hawks completed their season with a 7-4 overall record, including 5-2 in regular season region play and they were the Class A Public state runners up last year with a 27-2 record, including losing the championship game to Wheeler County by a 55-50

Georgia Military College 53, Lady Indians **44** – The Lady Indians faced a tall order in traveling some 150 miles to Milledgeville last Friday to face the Georgia Military College high school division team which entered the game with a 17-1 record and ranked fifth in the state in Class A Public by the Atlanta

The Lady Bulldogs' Elbert County, the top ranked Class 2A team in the state by The Lady Indians were the AJC with a current record

The Indians came oh so close to hosting a game against Bowdon on this date instead of traveling to Milledgeville as the GMC ladies used their earned home court status as the top seeded team from Region 7A to take a win over Bowdon, the fourth seeded team from Region 6A, but just by a score of 54-52 in overtime after trailing Bowdon 25-12 at halftime.

If Bowdon had pulled out a victory they would have had to travel to TCHS for the Friday game as the Lady Indians would have been the higher seed and earning home court advantage. But those are the breaks of the game in post season play.

The Lady Indians used excellent defense the first half and used a game opening three point basket by senior Vanessa Floyd for a 3-0 lead

Dahlonega - Blairsville's Mountain Gymnastics Center brought home four first-place all-around performances from January's Winter Warm-Up in Dahlonega.

Shy'Ann Beasley, Addison Harkins, Madelyn Primeaux, and Josie Poston each turned in their respective levels' highest all-around score at the January 23-24 event. In AAU Silver competition, Beasley's 37.4 marked the overall high score of the entire day and Harkins' 36.9 all-around tally

was the fourth-best total. Primeaux recorded a 36.3 score in AAU Bronze, finishing tied for first with a 9.6 on the beam and tying for second on the bars with a 9.0. In USA Gold Level 6, MGC picked up the top four spots, headlined by Poston's first-place performance

Poston's 36.65 all-around score featured a pair of firstplace finishes on the vault (9.3) and floor exercises (9.5). Right behind Poston was teammate Emma Schuette with a 36.625, highlighted by a first-place score of 9.3 on the bars. Lola Patton came in third with a 36.6 behind a high score of 9.35 on
