# King Cove and Gumlog to close on March 12

The Georgia Department of Transportation will be closing the SR 66 entrances to King Cove Road and Gumlog

Road on Monday, March 12. These entrances will be closed for no more than 210 days for construction of the new Brasstown Creek Bridge.

Residents who live on King Cove Road will use Crane Creek Road as a detour, which is available off SR 66.

People who live on Gumlog Road will have a slightly longer commute, as those traveling from Gumlog to town will need to take Barnard Road, which becomes West Road in North Carolina.

Folks should follow West Road until it dead ends into Young Harris Road, and follow that south into Georgia.

Coming from town, follow SR 66 into North Carolina, and take a left onto West Road.

The detour for Gumlog residents is right around four miles at most.

Having been in service since 1940, Brasstown Creek Bridge is simply an old bridge and ready to be replaced. Construction on the new bridge began late last year with grading and relocation of utility lines.

The new bridge is being built just west of the old bridge, and it will be higher and offer better sight distances for those turning off Gumlog and King Cove roads in the future.

"It'll be all realigned, especially Gumlog, not so much King Cove," said GDOT Project Manager Daniel Freeman. "The alignment

of King Cove is pretty much going to be the same, but Gumlog will be a little different configuration, safer. It's for the good of Towns County. It's going to be better.'

Later this year, GDOT will also close Crooked Creek Road for several months. And though the exact timing on that leg of the project has yet to be determined, it won't happen until after King Cove and Gumlog roads open back up.

"It's probably going to be coming up either this fall or possibly winter," said

Interested residents can find Freeman inside the GDOT project trailer, just north of the construction site on SR 66.

Local leaders and first responders have expressed concern over the street closures, which will add between 13 and See King Cove, Page 6A

# Deadline draws near for Towns **County homestead applications**

April 1 is the deadline for homeowners to apply for

a homestead exemption. Homeowners who qualify and apply will be eligible for a minimum \$10,000 exemption from the assessed value of their home and land, which will effectively lower a person's tax burden.

"We have several local exemptions," said Towns County Chief Appraiser Sonya


