North American B-45 Tornado Model

Never heard of this? Neither had I until Jim Hoyt, our American Legion Post #23 Commander for 7 years, now Past Commander informed me of his USAF duties and maintenance on these one time "secret" aircraft in Sculthorpe, Norfolk, England.



These post WWII models were our "Peace through Strength" contribution standing strong against Soviet aggression thus all our nuclear war. They were the first jet powered atomic bombers and assigned to NATO in the 1950s for high altitude all weather delivery of atomic weapons in the event of a Soviet Communist attack on Western Europe. Please note that these nuclear bombers were limited to about 400 miles per hour, slow by today's standards, yet unsurpassed for their load carrying capacity and high altitude capabilities of that day. And most importantly they were integral to America's peace keeping mission and deterrent to all out devastation by those who always seem to have a grudge against humanity and freedom. It bears repeating: "Freedom is NOT free!"

Those in England were considered top secret with their nuclear arsenal at the time and were heavily guarded by serious USAF personnel. Believe it or not some 30,000 sorties were flown during the period from 1952-1958 by 3 squadrons of the 47th Bomb wing out of RAF Sculthorpe, Norfolk and RAF Alconbury in Cambridgeshire.

Potential targets were covered around the clock were in Poland, East Germany, and Czechoslovakia. However during the period 1952 and 1954 due to American government restric tions concerning flying over the Soviet Union, RB-45Cs were painted with RAF markings and flown by RAF crews on reconnaissance operations. Why one might ask? It was extreme ly important to photograph Soviet bomber and missile sites.

Our armed airmen stationed with these highly classified weapons delivery systems were required to do their own laundry, cooking, housecleaning, etc. No civilians allowed! This very well stands to reason after being thoroughly vetted, physically, mentally, psychologically for this top secret mission. Master Gardener Appreciation Day

The month of March has a very special holiday. I'm not talking about St. Patrick's Day or the first day of spring. I'm talking about Master Gardener Appreciation Day! This important day falls on the third Saturday of March and celebrates some of the hardest working



individuals in our community. If you know a Master Gardener Extension Volunteer, please extend your appreciation and gratitude for all they do in the community.

For those of you not familiar with these incredible volunteers, let me give you a little background. The program started in Tacoma, Washington in 1972. As county agents were getting overwhelmed with the demands of the growing population, it was clear that they needed help with educating the community To do this, they recruited as many avid gardeners with a passion for education and volunteerism as they could find and provided them with additional horticultural training. These volunteers were dubbed "Master Gardeners" and mobilized within the community to help answer questions about gardening, plan local programs, and assist extension offices. Eventually, this program spread across the country to nearly every state.

Our local Master Gardener chapter consists of both Union and Towns County Volunteers. These individuals have gone through a rigorous ten week training course where they learn plant pathology, insect identification, native plant care ornamental plant varieties, and so much more. After passing two exams, Master Gardeners then have a fifty hour community service commitment their first year Trainees, and twenty hours for each subsequent year as official Master Gardeners. They attain these hours by planning educational, horticulturebased programs, working in the extension office, preserving demonstration gardens throughout the community, maintaining information booths at local events, and countless other ways.

In 2016, we worked with Fannin County to welcome a brand new training class of Master Gardener Trainees. These trainees have worked tirelessly with our veteran Master Gardeners to assist the extension office and educate the local community, contributing over 5,500 hours of volunteer service, which is valued at over \$128,000! Because of their hard work. Master Gardeners in every county are honored for their volunteerism and passion yearly on the third Saturday in March.

If you are interested in becoming a Master Gardener or have questions about what the program entails, please contact your extension office. This program is only offered every few years, so if you would like to be notified of when the next training begins, please let us know!

If you are interested in growing vegetables in your garden this year, please join extension for our annual Northeast Georgia Vegetable Production Meeting. This year, the meeting will take place on Tuesday, March 14th from 10:30am to 2:00pm at the Georgia Mountain Research and Education Center. There is no cost to register, and lunch will be provided courtesy of the White County Farmers' Exchange. Topics will include suggested vegetable varieties for our North Georgia climate, soil nutrient management, best management practices in pest management, and an update on the pesticide applicator's licensing requirements and procedures. Responding to property crimes

Property crimes such as thefts, burglary, stolen vehicles, etc., are increasing in many areas of the country. It can be very frightening to return to your home or business after being away to find that your property has been entered and your personal items stolen or damaged. You can help protect yourself and aid

your Sheriff's Office in finding the criminals and recovering your property if you follow these practices for safety and security recommended by the Georgia Sheriffs' Association:

When you return to your home or business, always do a quick visual inspection for signs of forced entry. These signs may include broken windows, removal of screens, doors kicked in, or locks damaged. If you see signs of forced entry, do not enter. It is important that you stay outside of the building. Call 9-1-1 immediately, but try to do so from a safe location, such as a neighbor's house or your own vehicle. If necessary, leave and drive to a safe location.

Do not enter the building without law enforcement. When they arrive, advise them of any weapons, animals, alarms, or dangerous conditions in the building. They will let you know when it is safe to re-enter your home or business. When they do, don't touch anything without first asking. Try to do a walkthrough with the deputy to advise of any stolen or damaged items. If you enter your home or business before noting signs of a burglary, leave immediately and call 9-1-1. If you return to your vehicle and see signs of damage, entry, or theft, call 9-1-1 immediately, and do not touch anything.

You can help your Sheriff's Office recover your property by providing as much information as possible on any stolen items, such as complete descriptions, make, model, color, or any serial numbers or identifying marks. It is often helpful to also make a video or photo journal of valuable items and provide it to the deputy in charge of your case. Ask your insurance company if they recommend inscribing identifying marks on electronics or other valuable items, such as lawn equipment.
