\$165,000, with \$40,000 coming from a safety project grant from the Georgia Department of Transportation and the remainder being paid for by SPLOST.

Mayor Gibby said that, so far, the project is coming in under budget, though the city won't know the final cost of the project until construction is finished.

Also in the March 6 meeting, the council discussed another upcoming construction project, this one on School Street.

School Street residents are likely familiar with the problem of standing water along parts of the roadway due to improper drainage, and the

project will revise the street's drainage lines with some minor road re-alignment.

The project has been in the planning stages for several years and finally went to bid last year, though construction has been delayed due to ongoing right-of-way negotiations with residents.

Mayor Gibby said she believes that Colwell Construction Company, which will be repaying Maple Street this month, will also be able to begin work on School Street in the coming weeks.

Colwell Construction successfully bid the School Street project for \$20,000 last year.

Of course, city officials

are always concerned with the safety of Young Harris residents, which is why they have made plans to improve visibility on a stretch of Bryson Road containing a blind spot.

The Bryson Road project, which is in the planning stages and doesn't have a cost yet, will entail straightening a pair of sharp turns in the road, and the city hopes to have that completed by the end of 2018.
