"County officials were made aware of the transfer and circumstances late last night," the EMA said on Facebook. "Steps have been taken to mitigate any further exposure

The transported individual – who was tested for the virus Monday morning is a teacher at Towns County Elementary School, which was in session through Friday,

James "Jimmy" Ernest Smith, 78, of Young Harris, passed away on Wednesday, March 11, two days after a car crash that sent him and another driver to Northeast Georgia Medical Center aboard separate life flight helicopters. The crash occurred

shortly after 1 p.m. on Monday, March 9, near Blue Ridge Mountain EMC Headquarters on Georgia 2 in Young Harris, according to GSP.

In the leadup to the crash, Smith's 2007 Ford Taurus was traveling east on Georgia 2 toward Hiawassee when it crossed over the centerline into the left westbound lane and striking a guardrail and coming baseball and golf. oncoming traffic, according to a rest, according to GSP.

Authorities familiar with the crash investigation believe Smith may have been experiencing a medical event such as a heart attack at the time of the accident, which would have contributed to his vehicle crossing the centerline.
