## Indians split with Commerce; fall at Prince Avenue

Towns County dropped two of three last week after splitting a doubleheader with Commerce on Friday in Hiawassee.

On Monday the Indians fell 8-2 to Prince Avenue but senior Jackson Taylor went deep for the fourth straight game.

In game one on Friday, Towns County edged Commerce 7-6 thanks to two runs in the bottom of the seventh by Major Moss and Brody Graper.

Moss finished 2-for-2 while Taylor was 1-for-3 but saw his long ball streak come to an end. However, he did extend his hitting streak to 14 games during the twin bill.

Will DeVries got the start and lasted 6 2/3 innings – allowing five earned runs, eight hits, and fanning six.

Zach Davenport recorded the win in just 1/3 innings but he was able to stop the bleeding in the top half of the seventh and keep his team within a run at 6-5.

After falling behind 3-0 in the first, Towns answered with three in their half of the inning when Adam Griffin drove in DeVries with a base hit to center, Moss was plunked with the bases loaded and Graper followed with a walk.

The Tigers made it 4-3 with a pair of singles sandwiched around a sacrifice bunt in the fourth.

Towns finally snatched the lead away in the fifth when an error off the bat of Kobe Denton scored Adam Barrett and Graper for a 5-4 advantage.

In the seventh, Com-

merce opened with a walk and a single, then a fielders choice put runners at the corners with one down.

A sacrifice fly to center tied things up at 5-5 before a stolen base and a single put Commerce up 6-5.

In the second game, Commerce prevailed 11-9 thanks to a five-run sixth after Towns held an 8-6 advantage.

Once again, the Tigers jumped out to a 3-0 lead but the Indians tied it up with one in the third on an RBI double from Taylor, and two in the fourth on bases loaded walks by Davenport and DeVries.

Two errors led to three Commerce runs in the fifth but Towns exploded for five in the bottom half of the inning.

A one-out double by Moss scored Griffin – who

single to lead off the inning. The next three batters, Graper, Bradshaw, and Kobe Denton were each hit by a pitch, with the third one scoring Moss with the bags full.

Davenport followed with a base hit to center to knot the score at 6-6 before a bloop single by DeVries brought home Bradshaw.

The final run came on a sacrifice fly by Taylor – scoring Kobe Denton – to give the Indians an 8-6 lead.

The Tigers' ensuing five-run explosion was also aided by a hit batter when the leadoff hitter was plunked and the next batter drew a four-pitch walk.

A base hit to right trimmed the Indians lead to 8-7, then consecutive errors put Commerce in front 9-8.

Following a fly out and



a ground out, the Tigers tacked on back-to-back, two-out RBI singles to go up 11-8.

In the bottom of the sixth, Barrett reached on a leadoff walk then advanced to third on a passed ball and a ground out. With one down, he would score on another passed ball but the Indians would be unable to get no closer than 11-9.

A DeVries walk in the seventh brought the tying run to the plate but a fly out and strikeout followed to end the game.

In the loss to Prince Av-

enue Kobe Denton, DeVries, and Moss each finished with a two-hit game while Taylor went deep but it wasn't enough as the visitors jumped out to a 3-0 lead (the first of three 3-0 deficits the Indians would face on the week) before Towns trimmed it to 3-2 in the fourth.

Prince would use a four run sixth to put the Indians away by a score of 8-2.

Towns finished with nine hits to Prince's 12 but three Indian errors proved costly.

Bradshaw started the game and went four innings –

allowing three earned runs and seven hits.

Seth Fullerton also allowed three earned in two innings before Moss worked a scoreless seventh.

Up next, the Indians will host Chestatee from Class AAAA on Wednesday before returning to region play when Providence comes calling on Friday.

On Monday, Towns County hosted Oglethorpe County but it came after the deadline. Stats and results will be available next week.
