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BOE touches on Title I Rewards, baseball field and school safety

Congratulations are in order for Towns County High and Elementary Schools, as both have earned the distinction of being named 2018 Title I Reward Schools.

In recognition of their successes, Schools Superintendent Dr. Darren Berrong presented TCHS Principal Dr. Connie Hobbs and TCES Principal Dr. Sandy Page with Title I award banners in the April 16 regular meeting of the Towns County Board of Education.

"The Department of Education recognizes schools in a couple different categories, Highest Performing and Highest Progress, on their achievement on the End of Course Tests and End of Grade Tests throughout a vision of what we're going to

"We had two of our schools recognized this past year as 2018 Title I Reward Schools.

The first is Towns County High School with Highest Progress, and they had some of the highest gains in the state of Georgia over a threeyear period on those tests.

'Secondly, Towns County Elementary School was named a Title I Reward School for having the highest performance on the standardized test over a three-year period."

In his Superintendent Report, Dr. Berrong said that the school system finally has a plan to tackle the soggy baseball field, the outfield of which has been saturated with water since before the start of baseball

"It'll be a herringbonetype pattern, with one main drain running through the center of the outfield, with fingers coming in from all directions of the outfield to that pipe. It will run over to the football field and down to one of the main drainage pipes at the football field.

"We had to run it in that direction to get enough fall for the water to actually travel into it, so that's why it's running in that direction. The hope is that will get most of the water off the field.'
