# Floyd makes the cut for Governor's Honors Program

"At the high school level, and even at the college level, with the classes that I've taken, I only get so much time to focus in that subject, because you've got the other three - science, math and English.

"But I'm going to have the entire summer to do history and social studies-based stuff, so I'm really looking forward to that. I like American history, and I am also interested in Georgia history, particularly with Towns County.'

It's official - ServLine will provide leak insurance to City of Hiawassee water

For a cost of \$1.80 per month for residential customers and \$2.50 per month for commercial customers, people can now protect themselves from a high water bill in the event of a water leak between the meter and their home or

#### **Early voting continues** ahead of May primary

Nonpartisan General Election is well underway.

Every weekday between now and May 18, during the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., registered Towns County voters can cast their ballots at the Towns County Board of Elections and Registration

The board office is located in Suite A of 67 Lakeview Circle in Hiawassee, and it will be open to voters even during lunchtime.

As of Friday, May 4, had voted early, and more than 20 absentee ballots had been requested for mailout.

There is one weekend day set aside for voters at the board office, which will be this Saturday, May 12, from Early voting for the 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., for May 22 General Primary and people too busy to vote during the scheduled weekdays of

> Since this is a primary, voters will need to declare a political party to receive a ballot, otherwise, voters will only be able to vote in the Nonpartisan General Election.

Election Day will be on Tuesday, May 22, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., and that day, voters should report to one of the four pre-assigned Towns County

## School renovations to begin after May 18 graduation

As soon as classes let out for the summer, the Towns County School System will embark on a major renovation The middle school, high

school and elementary school gym, which together make up the original 40-year-old buildings at the center of the Towns County Comprehensive School campus, are in dire need of renovation and improvement.

In order to better serve the needs of students, the older school buildings require new HVAC systems, total roof replacements and a complete upgrade of the existing wiring to accommodate, among other things, communications and

30 computers in each classroom would quickly trip a breaker.

The above example is something that has actually occurred at the middle school, and Dr. Berrong said that fixing the problem is not as simple as just installing a few new That's why the Towns

County Board of Education feels that a total upgrade is imperative, and fortunately, these buildings qualify for a modernization grant under Georgia guidelines because they are 40 years old, said Dr. Berrong.

Last year, the school board voted to apply for a modernization grant based on a \$3.3 million cost estimate from the architectural firm Robertson Loia Roof.
