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Softball: Lady Indians to put youthful mistakes in rear-view mirror

Towns County softball opens this week with its sights set on a state playoff berth in a new-look Region 8-A.

After relying on a young roster in recent years, the Lady Indians are primed for a breakout season behind an abundance of upperclassmen.


"Our seniors have taken on more of a leadership role over the summer and they have been outstanding," Towns County head coach Clay Livingston said. "It's also (the coaching staff's) second year in the program so they've been able to get used to us and know what to expect and how we do

The Lady Indians will host a scrimmage with West Hall on Tuesday before the season gets underway Thursday at West Hall. According to Livingston, the opener at West Hall could also end up classified as a scrimmage due to the Lady Spartans not having enough players to compete at the varsity level. If they elect to go with a JV schedule, Thursday's game will also go down as a scrimmage.

Regardless of when the season officially gets underway, the Lady Indians will enter with high hopes after returning all but two seniors (Sophia Shook and Jessica Taylor) from last year's squad. Unfortunately, Towns County will likely be without the services of dualthreat senior Kennedi Henson, who suffered her second ACL tear during the winter.

Over the last three years, Henson's leadership and athleticism have sparked the Lady Indians as the ace of the pitching staff and their leading slugger from the clean-up spot.

According to Livingston, he is taking Henson's recovery very slowly and not pressur-



he wouldn't rule out the possibility of the senior getting a few late-September plate expected to anchor the Lady appearances.

"She's taking her time and working with a physical therapist," he said. "One (ACL tear) is bad enough, but she's had two on the same knee. The last thing I want is to be responsible for a third (ACL injury) because we rushed her back too soon.
