



Lady Indians bounce back with big 15-0 win against the Lady Storm

The Lady Indians Varsity Softball Team bounced back from an 0-2 season start with a dominant offensive performance on Thursday, Aug. 15, at Lowell Nicholson Field.

Providence Christian Academy traveled to Hiawassee on Thursday for a regional matchup against the Lady Indians.

Starting on the mound for the third game in a row was the team's ace, junior Kennedi

The Lady Indians were able to get a quick three outs in the top of the first with a double play followed up with Henson striking the next batter out.

In the bottom of the first inning, leadoff batter and junior Remington Parker hit a single, which was followed with a double play after junior Jayce Young hit a fly ball.

With two outs, the offense for the Lady Indians started after Henson was walked and senior Sophia Shook hit a ground ball down the third baseline.

The Providence Storm third baseman overthrew first base for what should have been an easy out, and Shook turned the Storm error into an KBI triple.

year due to a basketball injury her freshman year, and she was not able to get on the mound until late in the 2018 season. "I told the girls after the

game that the biggest difference between the first two games and the Providence game was not the opponent, but it was us," Livingston said. "We don't control who we play, what they do. We control our effort and our attitudes."

Eleven of the Lady Indians were able to generate offense against the Storm: Parker was 1-for-2, Young was 1-for-3 with 2 RBIs, Henson was 1-for-1 with an RBI, Shook was 1-for-3, Mauldin was 2-for-3 with RBIs, Rylie Livingston was 2-for-3, Moss was 1-for-1 with an RBI, Durham was 1-for-1 with an RBI, Kenzie Livingston was 1-for-2 with an RBI, senior Jessica Taylor went 1-for-1 with an RBI, and sophomore Lilly Landrum was 1-for-1 with an RBI.

"I thought we swung the bats well and played solid defense behind Kennedi," Coach Livingston said. TCHS implementing spectator procedure changes at home football games

Towns County High School is excited about the new FieldTurf installed on the football field and the resurfacing of the track. In order to keep our facilities in excellent condition and to enhance security and safety measures, we are installing some changes for spectator entrance for football games at Frank McClure Memorial 1. There will be two

entrances into the stadium: (1) the main admission

entrance from the main school parking lot, following the sidewalk up the hill between the High School gym and Bus Garage

(2) entrance at the High School batting cages, all spectators that park in the elementary parking lot will walk up the access road that leads from the elementary school to top level of football stadium. Spectators that park in the baseball parking lot on first base side of field will drive up the access road. Admission gate for both walkers and drivers will be located at the batting cage area. NOTE: There will no longer be an admission entrance at the fieldhouse area.

2. For safety concerns, the elementary playground will be closed during football games. No children or students will be allowed on the playground during this time. Parents are asked to make sure their children to do go to this area. School officials and law enforcement will monitor this area and send children back



to the stadium bleachers. Announcements will be made during the game as a reminder.

3. Before and during the game, the entire track area will be closed to spectators and visitors. No one will be allowed to walk on the track or watch the game from the track. Authorized personnel only will be on the track and field area during the game. Again, this is for safety and security purposes and a GHSA policy.

4. No food or drink will be allowed on the track or FieldTurf.

5. The Towns County Indians football team will use the fieldhouse side of the field as the HOME side. Therefore, this side of the field and track will be closed to all spectators and visitors. Again, the admission gate that has been at the fieldhouse in previous years will no longer be used as an entrance into the stadium.

We are excited about the many changes and upgrades at Frank McClure Memorial Stadium, with the new Field-Turf, resurfaced track, and repurposed seating. We look forward to seeing and hearing you cheering and supporting our student-athletes.
