## Davenport's 179 yards and 3 TDs lead Indians past Hayesville 38-21

Zach Davenport and the Towns County rushing attack did a number on the visiting Yellow Jackets from Hayesville, NC.

And that number was 344 to be exact.

The Indians rushing attack finished with 344 yards on 40 carries for an average of 8.6 yards per carry.

"It all boils down to our offensive line opening holes," Head Coach John Cornett said. "We've got two good running backs who both probably went over 100 yards, but overall it was a nice team win. You can't give credit to just one person. All 11 guys on the field played great."

Meanwhile, the Yellow Jackets were unable establish a running game against a stingy Towns County defense that allowed just 79 yards on 30 carries.

It also didn't help Hayesville that they were playing catch-up all game long.

The Indians started the game near midfield when an onside kick was unsuccessful and Towns drove inside the Jackets' 10-yard line, where the Indians were forced to settle for a 32-yard field goal from Wesley Calhoun.

On Hayesville's first play from scrimmage, Towns recovered a fumble at the 13 and one play later, Cole Ledford took it to the house for a 10-0 advantage with 5:37 left in the first.

The Jackets answered quickly with a 74-yard touchdown pass, thanks in large part to a missed tackle at midfield that allowed the Hayesville receiver to jog uncontested into the end zone.

The PAT failed after a

high snap and the Towns lead was trimmed to 10-6 at the 4:10 mark of the opening quarter.

On the Indians' second play of the series, quarterback Trent Bradshaw and Davenport executed the option to perfection when the pitch to Davenport resulted in a 70-yard scoring run down the near sideline.

Leading 17-6, Towns' defense forced a three-and-out and following a punt, Bradshaw and the offense set up shop at the Hayesville 34.

Consecutive keepers by Bradshaw moved the Indians inside the 10. From there, he handed off to Logan Cowart and he bullied his way up the middle for a nine-yard score.

With 11:55 to play in the second, it was all Towns County, 24-6.

The defense forced another three-and-out and the offense was once again on the move.

A pass interference penalty moved Towns into Yellow Jacket territory until a fumble derailed the drive at the Hayesville 41.

Another Yellow Jacket punt was followed up by Towns' second straight turnover. This time, Hayesville picked off Bradshaw at their own 8-yard line with 5:00 to play before halftime.

Hayesville quarterback Alan Gillis had his offense

driving into Indian territory until an interception by Will Travis halted the Jackets at the 21-yard line.

The second half opened with a 12-play, 77-yard scoring drive by Hayesville to trim the Towns County lead to 24-14 with 6:35 to play in the third.

The Indians ensuing possession began at the 35 but stalled after an early first down, resulting in a rare Towns County punt.

Looking to pull within one score, the Jackets were intercepted by Ledford at their own 48.

When the third quarter came to a close, the Indians were in the red zone and look-

ing to put the game away with a touchdown.

Unfortunately, Towns was denied on 4th-and-10 from the 20 and Hayesville took over with 11:45 remaining.

A 16-yard pickup gave the Jackets some life but the Indians quickly forced three incompletions, before Cowart forced a fumble with a fourth down strip-sack.

"The defense played great and they're just some tough kids," coach Cornett said. "We tried to keep our toughest 11 players out there because we knew Hayesville would fight hard and they wouldn't quit. Kudos to them, they played really tough."

Just 25 yards away from the goal line, Davenport carried twice for gains of 5 and 12 yards. With a 1st-and-goal at the eight, Ledford powered his way to the two but Towns would be denied on two straight attempts from just outside the end zone.

Finally, Davenport punched it in on 4th-and-goal from the one - putting a stranglehold on the Jackets at 31-14 with 7:49 to play.

A turnover on downs by Hayesville handed the ball back to Towns at the 32 and with 4:01 remaining, Davenport scored his third touchdown (16 yards) of the day for a 38-14 advantage.

"We've got to learn to answer like that," Cornett said. "Last year we'd get inside the 20 and couldn't score. This year we have a nice kicker who kicked a field goal on the first drive, but this year we need to finish, and that's what we did. If we want to go to that next level, it's something we're going to have to continue to do."

The Jackets completed a nine-play, 66-yard scoring drive with a 4-yard touchdown pass with 31 seconds left.

Davenport wasn't the only Indians back to go over 100 yards as Ledford wound up with 103 yards and a score on 12 carries.

Bradshaw rushed six times for 33 yards, Chambers went for 20 yards on six carries, and Cowart finished with nine yards and a score on three carries.

The next game will be in two weeks at George Walton Academy and according to Cornett, that's all his team is focused on.

"That's our super bowl," he said. "We only have one game on our schedule and that's George Walton. For the next two weeks we're going to treat it as it's the last game of our lives."
