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## **Indians fight hard but lose season opener against rival Yellow Jackets**

The Boys in Blue hosted the Hayesville Yellow Jackets of North Carolina for their season opener at the newly renovated Frank McClure Memorial Stadium on Friday, Aug. 23.

The Indians were excited to finally get the chance to play on the new \$1 million artificial turf field for the first time, and they took to it charging out of the team's new tunnel – a 20-foot inflatable blue football helmet – Friday night under new Head Football Coach Jason Roquemore.

The Indians won the coin toss and elected to receive the ball, and senior Andrew Conrad took the opening kickoff 20 yards to the 25-yard line.

Sophomore Kyle Oakes started for the first time as the Indians' signal-caller that night, and the first play from scrimmage was a wide receiver screen to his brother, junior Garrett Oakes.

Oakes took off for 23 yards to midfield after he shook off the first Yellow Jacket defender who was in the backfield to make the play.

The very next play, the third in the game, Oakes dropped backed to pass and hit senior running back Dakota Edge for a 43-yard touchdown. The touchdown was negated due to an illegal motion penalty, however, and the Boys in Blue would never recover.

"We had a good plan, the kids did a good job early on executing," Roquemore said. "We got what we thought we were going to get.

After the score was wiped off, the Indians were forced to punt. As the Indians were in punt formation with Oakes 7 yards back, the long snap went over his head, and he was forced to fall on the ball, giving zone again. the Yellow Jackets possession inside the Towns County 30vard line.

"I thought our kids improved," Roquemore said. "If you look back at last week's tape and the tape from Friday moved the ball inside the 5-yard night, our kids are grading

Hayesville had a 21-0 lead at the end of the first half, and the Indians came out after halftime and forced the Yellow Jackets to punt the ball away.

During the third quarter, senior wide receiver Chris Boggus caught a short out route and was hit hard. Boggus was unable to get up after the hit and was taken off the field by EMTs

To let everyone know that he was OK, Boggus gave a thumbs-up as he left the field, and Roquemore said after the game that the senior was doing

The Yellow Jackets scored another touchdown on a 35-yard run down the sideline to take a 28-0 lead with 5:51 left in the third quarter. Hayesville ended the Indians' three-game win streak against them Friday night by beating Towns County

Commerce finished last year ranked first in the region and Top 10 in the state, with a 14-2 region record and 22-7 overall.

Currently, Commerce and George Walton are tied for first in the region, followed by Prince Avenue Christian and the Lady Indians, who are in the second and third spots.
