Fake Shriner arrested for alleged theft after collections at intersection

On Tuesday, Aug. 20, deputies with the Towns County Sheriff's Office responded to a complaint of a subject collecting money at the intersection of Georgia 75 South and US 76 in Hiawassee.

When deputies arrived on the scene, they spotted a male subject wearing a Shriner's Fez and a yellow caution vest with a bucket collecting money.

Deputies identified him as Tommy Erford Walker, 48,

of Demorest. At that time, the subject told deputies he was a Shriner and that his post had sent him to that location. He also said he did not have his ID card with him.

Recently, the White County Sheriff's Office arrested Walker for collecting money as a Shriner at the intersection of Georgia 254 and Duncan Bridge Road.

At that time, White County was able to confirm with the Yaarab Shrine Temple prosecution. All suspects are that Walker was not a Shriner. After being released

on bond in White County on Wednesday, Sept. 4, Towns County deputies arrested and charged Walker with theft by deception in reference to the Aug. 20 incident in Hiawassee.

He remained in the Towns County Jail until he was released on bond on Thursday, Sept. 5.

The case will be forwarded to the Enotah Judicial Circuit District Attorney's Office for presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.
