Indians record falls to 0-3 following 60-7 loss at Union County

Blairsville - The Boys in Blue traveled to Union County on Friday, Sept. 6, to try and avenge last year's 45-7 loss to the Panthers in Frank McClure Memorial Stadium.

Towns County won the coin toss and elected to receive the ball, with junior wideout Garrett Oakes and senior wideout Andrew Conrad back deep to receive the kick.

Oakes stepped up to the 2-yard line to field the kick, but he had to fall on the ball at the 5-yard line to prevent a turnover when he couldn't get a clean catch. The first play from the


