Indians fourth, Lady Indians fifth at 30th Battle of the States

Tucker Engert and Ava Thompson earn All-Tourament nod

The Towns County Indians finished the Battle of the States Christmas Tournament with a fourth-place finish following a loss to Rabun County in the Monday, Dec. 30th third-

Earlier, the Lady Indians took the season's rubber match vs. Hayesville, North Carolina after the rivals split the previous two December meetings.

Lady Indians 43, Hayesville, NC 40 - All-Tournament selection Ava Thompson's 15 points on five 3-pointers led Towns County to its second win of the year over the Jackets in the Battle of the

During the first period, Thompson was responsible for three of her team's five treys, helping the Lady Indians race ahead 21-7, before eventually holding off a late Hayesville

A Jackets' 7-0 run to close the first narrowed the gap to 21-14, but Kaleigh Beaver and Scotlyn Fain accounted for 7 of their team's 9 second-quarter points as Towns County built a 30-19 halftime

Thompson's triple expanded the margin to 33-19 early in the third, but Hayesville answered with a 5-0 spurt
