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Chamber of Commerce sponsors Business Showcase

More than 1,000 area residents flocked to the recreation center last week to see the best of what these businesses have to offer, and stock up on sales and specials as the holiday season is fast approaching.

Bigger than ever before,

both event featured vendors, chamber members and non-members, from Union and Towns counties, as well as countless others in the region, and served as an opportunity for businesses to hold raffles, give out samples of their product or simply hand out flyers in order to network across the area.

"There were a lot more here this year than last year," said Candace Lee, Towns County Chamber of Commerce President. "The parking lot stayed full and there were no empty places in the parking lot throughout the evening, so that was really good."

Hiwassee Police Chief Paul Smith attended the Chief Executive Training Class for newly appointed chiefs of police and heads of law enforcement agencies at the Dr. Curtis E. McClung Training Center in Duluth from Sept. 18 to Sept. 27.

The 60-hour course, administered and provided by the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police, or GACP, is required by state law for all newly appointed heads of law enforcement agencies.

The curriculum is designed to give newly appointed law enforcement administrators and command staff personnel training on police management, as well as inform them of laws and policies affecting their departments.

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City Hall misses opportunity to fix elected official pay pre-election

During the Hiwassee City Council work session on Monday, Sept. 25, the Council shared that the salaries for elected city officials will not be changed due to an oversight regarding the second reading of the ordinance.

"There was a discussion about this back in May," said Thomas Mitchell, Hiwassee City Attorney. "There was direction given during the May 30 meeting. Then, during the regular meeting in the month of July, there was a first reading held for elected official salaries, setting the Mayor's salary at \$26,000 and setting the council member salary at \$200 a month."

Hiwassee Police Chief on what to do after witnessing a crash

Tragically, more than 30,000 Americans die in traffic accidents each year, though that's only a fraction of the total number of annual car accidents.

To put that into perspective, in September alone, there were at least 11 motor vehicle accidents in the small mountain city of Hiwassee, and already this year, more than 1,100 people have died on Georgia roadways.

For people who witness a car accident, should they choose to follow the example set by the Good Samaritan, there are certain things they can do to both help the people involved and to remain safe as bystanders.

"If you witness a car accident and you are driving as well, make sure that you are safe - pull off the roadway and get to a safe position so that

you don't cause an additional accident," said Hiwassee Police Chief Paul Smith.

Chief Smith added: "Once you're safe, take out your phone and call 911. Let the dispatchers know where

the accident is, how many vehicles there are, if anyone's injured. If you're not sure on that, just call anyway, that way we can get the process started
