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Despite Homecoming loss to Lions, Indians have a memorable night

The Towns County Indians Varsity Football team would have loved nothing more than to secure a win against Hebron Christian Academy during their Homecoming Game on Friday, Sept. 30, in Frank McClure Memorial Stadium.

They didn't, though when all was said and done, it was still a good night.

The Indians put up 13 solid points to the Lions' share of 31, and the thing of it is, the two teams were pretty evenly matched – the Lions just capitalized on more opportunities, such as turnovers.

Russell Cox demonstrated his serious carrying ability with multiple first downs in the first half, striking up the middle several times while punching through holes he had to make himself.

Down 10 points to nothing coming out of the half, the Indians decided to kick it up a notch in the third quarter with a 77-yard-touchdown pass from quarterback Trent Bradshaw to receiver Logan Cowart.

The special teams/offense/defensive combo package of Major Moss kicked in a good point after, and all of a sudden the Indians found themselves on the scoreboard with 7 points.

During the subsequent kickoff to the Lions, Major attempted an onside kick – and nailed it, even going so far as to recover it himself.

Unfortunately, what seemed like a rally ended up being four plays that turned the ball over on downs.

The Indians declared that they weren't done, however. Down by 17 points with less than half a quarter remaining to them, the Boys in Blue pulled it together for another touchdown.

Once again, young Bradshaw with his dynamo arm hit a 50-yard pass to Moss, who took it in for the score. These would prove to be Towns County's final points, and the game came to an end shortly thereafter.

The night wasn't over, however, as the Indians made their way to their clubhouse to get ready for their post-game Homecoming Dance.

One of their own, No. 50 Walker Ross, had been crowned Homecoming King the day before, so there was still plenty of celebrating to do.

Halftime consisted of Kristen Henson being crowned the 2016 Football Homecoming Queen, followed by Runner-Up Princess Madison Stroud.

After the game, the Towns County Cheerleaders and the Indian Raider Band took to the field to perform their dedicated halftime shows, which had to be bumped up due to Home-

coming festivities.
