#### CHATUGE REGIONAL **NURSING HOME**

The COVID-19 outbreaks at Union County Nursing Home and Chatuge Regional Nursing Home continued last week, with most residents at both facilities having already tested positive for the virus as of Friday,

These outbreaks line up with the recent uptick in community spread, though positives in Union and Towns counties appear to be on the decline, remaining elevated in recent state reporting data due largely to the number of tests

Other long-term care facilities in the area have including nursing homes in Fannin, Lumpkin, Rabun and Habersham.

Union County experienced only one new positive among nursing home residents last week, bringing the total number of residents testing for COVID to 102 of 118, or about 86% of the

Eleven people have died in connection with the Blairsville outbreak that began in mid-August, with the last resident death as of press time having occurred the week of

As far as health care workers, an additional 16 nursing home employees tested positive in Union last week, bringing the total number associated with this outbreak near 100, or more than 50% of nursing home staff.

being conducted at the local up an additional 18 resident positives last week, down from 26 new positives the week before; all told, 71 of 92 total suffered outbreaks as well, residents have tested positive for the virus, or about 77% of

the population. Three residents have died in connection with the outbreak that began toward the beginning of September in the Hiawassee-based facility, with no new deaths occurring

As of Friday, the Towns nursing home also featured 56 positive tests among employees, which is slightly under 50% of staff members

Most residents in both facilities have experienced either mild symptoms or were asymptomatic after testing positive for the coronavirus, and only one resident - from Chatuge - was hospitalized as Friday.

"Chatuge is still early into their outbreak, so anything can happen there, and we do expect more asymptomatic See Nursing Homes, Page 8A
