## Indians looking to regroup during bye week after seventh loss of season

Dacula - The Boys in Blue fell to 0-7 on the season after suffering a 42-20 loss against Hebron Christian Academy on Friday, Oct. 11.

Towns County won the coin toss and elected to receive the ball, and the opening kickoff went out of bounds, giving the Indians the ball at their own 35-yard line.

Facing a third-and-5, sophomore quarterback Kyle Oakes was sacked for a 4-yard loss as he dropped back to

After a 35-yard punt from Oakes, the Lions took possession on the 29-yard line in their own territory, only to be flagged on their first play from scrimmage for a block in the back, putting them in a first-and-18.

Junior defensive back Garrett Oakes put the Lions in a third-and-3 situation after making a tackle and breaking up a pass in coverage, which Reace Hampton followed up by sacking the Lions quarterback for a 3-yard loss to force a fourth-and-6.

The Lions quarterback got the Indians to jump offsides with a hard count, and the next play, the Lions ran a quarterback sneak for 2 yards and a first down.

Oakes made another great defensive play, breaking up a pass to put the Lions in a third-and-10 on the Towns County 15-yard line, but the Lions quarterback made it into the end zone on a 15-yard scamper. A good point-after gave Hebron a 7-0 lead with 4:45 left in the first quarter.

The Lions scored five more times to take a 42-0 lead heading into the half after holding the Indians scoreless.

Towns County started the second half with a tremendous defensive stance, as Hampton made a tackle for a 6-yard loss to put the Lions in a fourth-and-long situation.

Hebron Christian Academy elected to go for it on fourth-and-11, and junior Nick Houser sacked the Lions quarterback for an 8-yard loss, giving the Indians the ball in Hebron territory.

On the ensuing drive, Oakes took off for an Indians first down. After a 4-yard run from senior running back Dakota Edge, Kyle Oakes connected with his brother Garrett for a 45-yard touchdown pass to put the Indians on the board.

The Indians succeeded on a 2-point conversion to cut the lead down to 34 with just Lions defender during the 29under a minute left in the third yard run.
