Early voting continues in Hiwassee General and Special Elections

Early voting for the Hiwassee General and Special Elections began on Monday, Oct. 16.

Early voting continues this week, and runs weekdays now through Friday, Nov. 3, each day from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Polls will be open during lunchtime.

Both early voting and Nov. 7 Election Day voting will occur inside the Towns County Board of Elections and Registration Office, which is adjoined to the Towns County Civic Center just

down from the Towns County Courthouse.

Nov. 7 Election Day voting will run from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

All voting will take place on the county's voting machines.

Those interested in voting on an absentee ballot will need to inquire at the Towns County Board of Elections Office. Only eligible Hiwassee voters will be voting in this election, and the board office invites people to call ahead to check if they are a registered Hiwassee voter.

There are five candidates running for office in the Nov. 7 Hiwassee General Election,

though Amy Barrett is running unopposed: Liz Ordiales and Barry Dearing for mayor; Barrett for Post 1; Incumbent Jay Chastain Jr. and Patsy Owens for Post 2.

For the Nov. 7 Hiwassee Special Election, which is running concurrently with the General Election, Ann Wedgwood and Nancy Noblet are each vying for the Post 5 Hiwassee City Council seat.

The Post 5 seat is part of a special election because whoever is elected, instead of the usual four-year elected term, the winner will fill the remaining two years of the term of former Hiwassee City Councilmember Ordiales.

on the streets, alleys and public places of the city during the calendar year 2017."

Nelms' other stated objection deals with the imposition of multiple fees on shared infrastructure.

"Further, the additional assessment of charges for fiber and cable consumers amounts to double taxation since the facilities used to provide that service are the same ones used to provide electric service," according to his letter to the city.

The EMC has prepared information for the public in anticipation of questions concerning the new fees, which will be paid for by EMC customers inside Hiwassee City Limits, including residential, business and industrial accounts.

"The franchise tax fee being levied by the City of Hiwassee will be paid solely by the roughly 1,000 plus BRMEMC Members residing or doing business within the City of Hiwassee, as it applies to all residential, commercial and industrial accounts located within the city's jurisdiction," according to the internal material.

"This franchise tax fee will show up as a separate line item on members' monthly electric and broadband statements," the information continues. "Should a member have any questions or concerns about this new franchise tax fee, please have them contact the City of Hiwassee directly at (706) 896-2202."

Continues the information: "BRMEMC must pass along this new franchise tax fee to the citizens of the city for two primary reasons. First, BRMEMC does not have sufficient funds set aside to pay for these new franchise tax fees in our budget."

"Second, if BRMEMC paid these fees out of its

general budget, and did not collect them from those located within the city, our member-customers located outside the City of Hiwassee (even those located in NC counties) would be unfairly charged for franchise tax fees associated with delivering services in an area in which they are neither located or responsible to financially support."

The City of Hiwassee received Nelms' letter last week. When reached for comment, Hiwassee Mayor Pro Tem Anne Mitchell said the city was in the process of preparing a response with the city attorney.

As previously reported, the franchise monies will go into the city's general fund to be available for improvements around the city.

Though thus far uncommonly applied to the Blue Ridge Mountain EMC, franchise fees are extremely common around the state.

"After impact, both vehicles came to a rest in the crossover of Georgia 515 (Georgia 2)," Cpl. Bradburn said. "Ms. Garrett was pronounced dead at the scene. Mr. Moss was transported to Union General Hospital with minor

injuries."
