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After tough loss in Athens, Indians look ahead to Homecoming Game Friday

ATHENS – The Towns County Indians Football Team fell to 0-5 on the season after traveling to Athens-Clarke County on Friday, Sept. 27, to take on the Spartans of Athens

Athens Academy is currently the top-ranked football team in the single-A region and has competed in back-toback state championships.


The Spartans won the coin toss and elected to receive the ball, returning the opening kickoff 57 yards into Towns County territory.

Athens Academy scored first on a 14-yard screen pass in the opening minute of the first quarter. They received a flag, however, which backed them up 15 yards for the point-after attempt, and Athens Academy missed the 35-yard kick.

With the Indians down 6-0, they started their first offensive drive from their own 20-yard line after the Athens Academy kickoff sailed into the endzone for a touchback.

The Indians offense continued its struggles from last week with another bad snap from the center that sailed over the head of Indian sophomore quarterback Kyle Oakes.

Facing a second-and-19, Oakes lined up in pistol formation and connected with his brother junior Garrett Oakes for a wide-receiver screen, but the Spartans were not fooled, tackling Garrett for a three-
