## E-911 Center to get new phone system; Bradshaw renews Forestry contract

In a Nov. 6 called meeting, Towns County Sole Commissioner Cliff Bradshaw signed a \$220,000 lease agreement with AT&T to upgrade the phone system at the E-911 Dispatch Center.

The original price for the new system was around \$270,000, though Bradshaw said E-911 Director Marty Roberts talked the company down to \$220,000 for a fiveyear lease.

"We've got about a \$49,000 discount on it, plus they included some free equipment at the end that we needed," Bradshaw said. "We looked at buying and we looked at leasing.

"The lease price was just a little bit more, but when

you look at the numbers, the reliability of 911 will be lease process included the greatly improved with the maintenance on it.

"So, instead of having to pay quarterly maintenance on it, it's included in the lease price, which also means that if lightning hit and took the whole tower out, they would replace it at no charge in the lease."

The current phone system is about 12 years old and costly to repair. For example, replacement charges for past the current analog system, damage to just two phones cost about \$14,000, though the same damage will be 100% covered under the new lease agreement.

## **GSP** says Young Harris man at fault in Fire Department crash

A Towns County man has received two misdemeanor citations following a head-on collision with a Union County Fire Department vehicle on Nov. 1, according to the Georgia State Patrol.

Joey Bruce, 50, of Young Harris, has been charged with failure to maintain lane and failure to yield right of way to an emergency vehicle, according to GSP.

The accident occurred on Murphy Highway/US 129/ Georgia 11 between Rogers Road and Nottely Marina at about 5:15 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 1, according to GSP.
