Football: Indians suffer 34-27 home loss; season ends away Friday

The Boys in Blue hosted the Social Circle Redskins Friday night at Frank Mc-Clure Memorial Stadium for their last home game of the

Heading into the game, the Indians were coming off a blowout win at Greene County that gave them a 3-4 record, and they were hoping to carry that momentum into Friday's

Social Circle won the coin toss and elected to defer until the second half, giving Towns County the ball to start the game Nov. 13. Junior Collin Crowder

returned the opening kickoff to the Towns County 34-yard line, but the Social Circle defense forced a quick three-andout, and the Indians punted. The Redskins blocked the punt to get the ball at the Towns County 35-yard line. In their opening drive,

the Redskins struck first with a 12-yard touchdown pass to take an early 7-0 lead with 10:14 left in the first quarter. The Social Circle de-

fense forced a turnover on downs as the Indians faced a fourth-and-inches, but the Indians defense got a stop of their own with a turnover at the Social Circle 48-yard line. Following a Towns

County first down, the Redskin defense forced another turnover on downs to take possession at their 46-yard line, but the Indians got the ball right back on downs at the Towns County 28-yard line.

Senior Quarterback Mason Thomas connected on a pass to junior Wide Receiver Jake McTaggart for 10 yards and an Indian first down on the ensuing drive. Then Thomas dropped back to pass again but pulled the ball down and took off for a 9-yard gain.

Junior Running Back Kyle Oakes ran the next handoff up the middle for 3 yards and another Indian first down at midfield. At the end of one, the Social Circle Redskins led the Towns County Indians

- Seats not available for use will be zip-tied closed all season.
- NO tickets will be sold at the door on game days.
- Single game tickets will be \$6.00 and sold online (if available). Elementary age children must sit with their parents. All elementary age children must be
- accompanied by an adult. Middle School students are allowed to sit in the "Student Section" with the High School
- students if they purchase their ticket on game day at school for \$3.00 each (as available, seating is limited). Parents that do not want their middle school student to sit in the "Student Section" must purchase a season pass (\$50.00) for their child to sit with them.
- High School students will have the opportunity to purchase game day tickets at school for \$3.00 each and High School students will sit in the "Student Section".
- Absolutely no child or student will be allowed to "roam" freely in the gym. No student will be allowed to "hang out" on the stairs, in the gym lobby, or any area of the gym. All spectators are asked to return to their seats after visiting the restroom or concessions and refrain from standing along the railings.
