Basketball: Lady Indians and Indians take decisive victories at Nantahala

Nantahala, NC - The Towns County High School Lady Indians and Indians varsity basketball teams traveled to Nantahala, North Carolina, High School last Tuesday and came away with decisive victories over the Lady Hawks and Hawks.

The Lady Hawks struggled to a 4-21 record last year and lost two seniors from that team but four of their top scorers were non seniors.

The Hawks, on the other hand, compiled an 11-14 record a year ago and although losing four seniors they returned three of their top four scorers who will be recognized at the end of the article.

Lady Indians 49, Nantahala 31 – The Lady Indians took 4-2 and 6-4 leads on field goals by senior Sophia Shook and junior Vanessa Floyd at the 7:54 and 7:08 marks of the first quarter and got ahead for good 7-4 on a trey by junior Kennedi Henson at 4:23.

A trey by freshman Tabitha Barnes followed at 3:28 for a 10-4 Lady Indians lead and baskets by junior Jayce Young and Floyd more than matched a deuce by the Lady Hawks during the final minute and a half for a 14-6 Towns lead at quarter's end.

The Lady Indians used the success of five players entering the scoring column in the first quarter as a springboard to a 27-8 lead at intermission and a 39-13 advantage after three quarters before the Lady Hawks closed the margin a bit during the final quarter in a 49-31 Towns victory

They continued the pattern of several players entering the scoring column with six accomplishing the feat in the second, five in the third, and three in the fourth.

GHSA Realignment brings changes to 8-A

On the heels of the Georgia High School Association's recent split between public and private schools at the region-level in Class A, Towns





County High School's athletic schedules are going to look very peculiar when the 2020-21 school year gets underway next summer.

Last week's GHSA Reclassification Committee meeting brought major changes to the newly titled "Region 8-A Public" that Towns County High School has called home for the better part of four decades. Gone are the Athens and Atlanta-area private schools, but still intact is a widely-dispersed region that traverses the entirety of Northeast Georgia.

Commerce remains in Region 8-A Public as Towns County's nearest opponent and a familiar face from previous seasons. Joining those two will be a handful of schools from Region 7-A and another from Region 8-AA.

Greene County, Lincoln County, Warren County and Washington-Wilkes will remain in Class A, making the lateral jump from Region 7 to Region 8-A Public. Meanwhile, Social Public from Region 8-AA, rounding out the seven-team region.
