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Save-A-Lot robbed at gunpoint; authorities search for suspect

By press time Monday, the Hiwassee Police Department was working a lead and gathering evidence in an armed robbery of the Save-A-Lot Food Store on Wednesday, Nov. 22.

Armed robberies are rare in the area, and Hiwassee Police Chief Paul Smith said that he believes this crime to be an isolated incident.

"We have a pretty good lead at this point," said Chief Smith. "We're in the gathering and building stage, and hopefully that will lead to an arrest."

Hiwassee Police Sgt. Tracy James and Officer

Tony Verdone responded to the scene of the robbery at 8:25 p.m., within one minute of the 911 call that was placed by an employee of the Save-A-Lot after the robber had fled the scene.

Upon arrival, the two officers began an immediate search of the area, and Towns County Sheriff's K-9 Deputy Bloodhound Copper soon after attempted to track the suspect to no avail.

Authorities are considering the possibility that the robber made his way to a vehicle parked nearby to get away from the area.

As reported by the Save-A-Lot employees at the scene, a slim white male approximately 6 feet 3 inches tall appeared from the rear of

the store it had closed.

The man wore a mask and brandished a handgun, and after locking one employee in the store cooler, he led the other at gunpoint to the store's safe, where he stole an undisclosed amount of cash before fleeing on foot.

Fortunately, neither of the employees was harmed during the incident, and though several nearby businesses went on lockdown after the robbery, no one else reported any related incidents.

The Hiwassee Police Department has been reviewing video footage and other evidence, and Chief

Christmas is less than a month away, and helping to create a fun, spirit-filled environment of joy and wonder is none other than the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds with its "Mountain Country Christmas in Lights!"

On Thanksgiving night, after all the turkey and pie had been enjoyed, patrons flocked to the Fair-

grounds for opening night of the light show, enjoying the thousands of twinkling holiday lights and the holiday spirit floating through the grounds.

Although it has only been opened for one weekend, the light show has already garnered more than double the attention it received during opening week last year, with more than 2,000 guests for the entire weekend.
