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### **Tropical Storm Zeta floods Hiwassee River, knocks power out**

Tropical Storm Zeta delivered a one-two punch of wind and water on Oct. 29, leaving thousands in the area without power last week.

In neighboring Blairsville, equipment at the Experiment Station measured 45 mph winds shortly before the storm moved its way into Towns early Thursday morning, where it downed trees and powerlines and dropped enough water to flood the Hiwassee

River and several creeks. The storm made landfall in Louisiana as a Category 2 hurricane around 5 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 28, traveling swiftly across the southeast corner of Mississippi to cut up through Alabama, where it was downgraded to a tropical storm before entering North

Georgia. More than a million people lost power throughout the northern half of the state, with BRMEMC reporting roughly 21,000 customers in the dark for its five-county territory at the peak of the outage as its tireless crews worked through the weekend to restore electricity systemwide.

Commissioner Cliff Bradshaw was proud of his Road Department for working around the clock as well, as they joined the EMC in clearing trees from county roads while

before entering North ia. Hurt locally, but the storm did kill three Georgians with trees on homes – one person in Cherokee County and two people in Buford – as it cut northeastward through the state.

> A band of rain ahead of the tropical storm dropped 2.34 inches of water as measured by the Experiment Station Wednesday, so the river and creeks were already swollen by the time Zeta arrived Thursday morning with an additional 2.7 inches of rain, with even more See Zeta, Page 6A

Towns County High School Teacher Kenneth Camp was treated to a surprise announcement Oct. 30, when he learned via Zoom that he was a First-Place winner in the nation for Voya's Unsung Heroes grant award.

Camp's innovative teaching idea, "Aquaponics Greenhouse," focuses on an expansion of the school's already successful aquaponics program.

The current aquaponics system boasts tanks of around 300 tilapia, 150 goldfish, and 50 catfish fertilizing three grow beds, where tomatoes, peppers, numerous herbs, coleus, strawberries, ginger, zinnias, okra and bananas are harvested and sold in the community.

This system serves as the focus for several rigorous year-long inquiry-based student research projects that help to maintain and improve the system.
