### America's Other Enemy

Our beloved friend Todd Kimsey, now resting in peace at the Right Hand of our Lord, told me many stories on this little known history of WWII as our Navy had completed several days of operations against the Japanese in the Philippine

To be exact, Task Force 38, seven fleet, six light carriers, eight battleships, fifteen cruisers and fifty destroyers were located about three hundred miles east of Luzon. Todd was aboard the USS Pasadena, attached to the Third and then the Fifth Fleet and was in one of two deadly typhoons in this

We must bear in mind that we had no satellite weather projection data, weather radar as today, and had to rely on educated "reckoning" as to what when and where catastrophic weather would develop, back then. After spending three days in heavy bombardment of crit-

ical Japanese held positions in this AO, the seas grew rough very rough. Many of our ships were extremely low on fuel and attempted to refuel under hazardous conditions. Many of our Greatest Generation, struggling to do their duty as the "kids" they were back then never faltered in whatever jobs they were assigned to. Todd informed me that many were seasick

And on December 18, 1944, one of the most violent typhoons overtook our task force with greater fury than the Samoan hurricane of 1889. Buffeted by hurricane force winds and extreme seas, we lost three destroyers, the USS Hull, USS Spence, and USS Monaghan and all hands aboard.

A cruiser, five aircraft carriers, three destroyers were critically damaged as well as 146 aircraft were lost when the storm broke them loose from their hangers, resulting in fires aboard the carriers. History records that over 790 officers, and men were lost at sea or killed outright. Eighty escaped death with serious injuries.

In lieu of our obvious losses, our Pacific Fleet built new weather stations in the Caroline Islands, Manila, Iwo Jima, Okinawa, Guam and Latte. Obviously after securing these sites from Japanese invaders. Additionally there were some very serious charges sought and court of Inquiry brought forward by Commander in Chief, Pacific fleet in the aftermath of these weather related, horrendous losses.

To learn far greater detail and some very interesting history concerning our WWII generation and this little known history I highly recommend reading "Halsey's Typhoons, by Adamson and "Typhoon, The Other Enemy" by Calhoun.

Never forget that in our history of America, those who sacrificed and wore any of our nation's uniforms are the singular most important reason we even exist. And never forget our heroes who never came home. They too are resting at the Right hand of our Supreme Commander, where there are no storms! Be forever thankful for our men and women in uniform, including our EMTs, Police and Firefighters. They all risk their lives every day of the year for ALL of us, especially in this 'politically correct" era.

As is reflected in military historical accounts, never trivial and often ignored or forgotten, our nation would not survive without them. Semper Paratus

### **Erosion Control**

Georgia, along with much of the southeastern US, doesn't have a positive past with erosion. Repetitive cropping of cotton in the Piedmont resulted in seven inches of topsoil being washed away into the ocean.



is something that is felt for generations. By the 1950s, new policies and programs began to change Georgia from endless cotton fields to forestland and other uses that are less susceptible to erosion. In the mountains, there is always a threat of erosion if we aren't proactive with protecting our landscape. Let's talk about why we should care about erosion and some things that you can do to make sure that your land isn't eroded away. Erosion can also lead to water quality issues. Not only

does the topsoil muddy up our lakes and rivers, but also the nutrients that the topsoil is carrying can create algal blooms leading to decreased aquatic life. That is bad news for our lakes and the fish that inhabit them. Erosion can also create a hard pan that will repel water and increases surface runoff. So let's talk about what you can do to reduce erosion. Firstly, construction makes soil very susceptible to erosion.

Removing all the vegetation from the top of the soil leaves it open to the rainfall. In construction, surround the project site

with hay bales and silt fences, preserve the already existing vegetation, and keep any piles of loose vegetation or gravel covered. Whenever you're clearing land try to leave as much of the existing vegetation as possible. This means you won't need to plant as much back once your project is finished. Planting permanent vegetation is the long-term goal for erosion control. Mulch can also be used temporarily while you are establishing vegetation. Grasses are really good at inter-

cepting runoff and infiltrating it back into the soil. Shrubs are good at creating cover and habitat for wildlife, and trees are best at blocking noise. Keep stream banks covered with vegetation and trees. Those plant roots will solidify that stream bank so that the natural erosion process will be slowed down. It will keep the stream from widening. In gardens and around the home use

mulch or compost when possible to protect bare soil. This will

improve water infiltration into the soil and reduce runoff. Cleared land is most likely going to need lime and fertilizer before you can replant it with vegetation. A soil test is a great place to start to learn how much lime and fertilizer you

Minimizing impermeable surfaces such as the driveway or walkway on your property will also reduce erosion. Obviously, you will need some impermeable surfaces at your property, such as a roof for your house. For cases like that, it's important to design pathways for the water from those impermeable surfaces to travel so that they can be deposited in a rain garden or pond. Rain gardens collect water allow the water to infiltrate back into the soil instead of having it run downhill. Usually they have plants that are adapted to living in damp
