Performing live in concert as "The King" himself, Roy Perren sang a selection of Elvis songs along with a few other well-known tunes to get people in the holiday spirit.

"I really enjoy singing, and I enjoy it when you connect to the audience and they connect to me and we feed off of each other," Perren said. "It's just a lot of fun when you see people smiling and singing along with

"I believe that music touches people's hearts and you kind of forget everything going on in the world because we are busy having a good time. And that's why I do these shows, is to have a good time.

Perren has been singing his entire life, having gotten into it during his childhood years, and he's pushed his voice further ever since.
