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Indians end five-game skid with 2-2 draw at unbeaten Union

Blairsville - The Towns County Indians soccer team tied undefeated Union County 2-2 on Monday, March 23.



In the last 25 seconds of the game, Union senior Kyle Hamby scored on a long ball, ending the Indians' chance to beat their rival Panthers.

"That was a heartbreaker at the end," said Indians Head Coach Michael Huwe. "As a coach, there's lots of times where it's not a prevent defense like in football, but you start playing a little defensive. We had a couple of shots where we didn't crash the net in the end because we were trying to stay back. Maybe it could have gotten us an extra goal, but their player had a beautiful strike from about 30 yards out that hit the upper corner. Really, there's not a lot you can do about that when a player makes a shot that's that good."

Heading into the game, the Indians record was 0-5 and the Panthers were undefeated, sitting at 5-0. Coach Huwe said that in a game that close against a team as good as Union County, a tie is much better than a loss.

"We played as well as I think we can play," said Coach Huwe. "We passed the ball, we had good strikes on goal, we finished, we played great defensively, limited them throughout the entire game, and we played under control. So, it's probably some of the best soccer I've seen us play at Towns County so far. You've just got to be able to reproduce that over and over and over again."

This is not Coach Huwe's first time coaching soccer, either. He played goalie in high school and has coached all levels, from little kids all the way up to assistant coach of

other high school and middle school programs.

"Overall, the boys are really coming along," said Coach Huwe. "We're starting to be able to pick out three, four, five mistakes during the course of a game instead of it being three,

four, five good plays in a game. So, they're starting to understand how to play soccer and how to play as a team. Right now, we just don't have the skill to overcome mistakes very easily, so we almost have to be perfect to stay in games."

"But they are playing really well. They're handling the basics – they're trapping, they're passing, they're getting open. They're covering for each other defensively. We've got to eliminate mistakes and we'll be right there with teams."

Making the team are seniors Dallas Manus, Cory Ellis, Grayson Carver, Kyle Davis, Efren Figueroa; juniors Dalton Bradley, Shea Underwood, Austin Watson, Chaiz Davenport, Gavin Langelier; sophomores Tyler Sisco, Tyler Grimsley, Marshall Ledford, Owen Bouchard; and freshmen Xavier Hogset, Dawson Hogset and Trent Whidden.

The boys played their first home game of the year on Friday, March 27, against Lakeview, losing 5-3.

Heading into the half, the score sat at 2-0, Lakeview in the lead. Towns County went on to score three goals in the second half, aided by a brilliant header by a Lakeview player into his own goal.

Coach Huwe acts as head

coach for the boys team, while Coach Tucker Blackmon acts as head coach of the girls team. They are each other's assistant coaches when the other is head coaching.

"The program just needs to have a steady growth," said Coach Huwe. "We need to get the middle school more involved, but where everyone is playing the same system and playing soccer more than just during the season – passing and getting together on weekends

and playing a little bit of soccer will help, too.

"We're a small school, the kids are great. They work hard, they've done everything we've asked of them, and it's just a progression. We're in stage one of a progression that usually takes two or three years. And throughout the season, I mean every game, I can see them grow a little bit, and I think Coach Blackmon would say the same thing."

On Thursday, April 2, at 6:30 p.m., and Friday, April 3, at 5 p.m., the Indians will play against Athens Christian, away and home.


Nearly a week later during spring break, the Indians will play Providence in a doubleheader at home, Thursday, April 9, beginning at noon.


The hunt will be held on the recreation ballfields located on U.S. Hwy 76 just west of Hiawasse. Entrance to the ballfield complex will

LARSON OUT AT MARTINSVILLE

Kyle Larson, driver of the No. 42 Ganassi Racing Chevrolet didn't make Sunday's Sprint Cup race.

During an autograph session at his hauler on Saturday, Larson fainted and slipped to the pavement unconscious.

He was first taken to a Martinsville hospital, where he reported that he was feeling fine. Later, he was transferred to Charlotte's Carolina Medical Center for further evaluation by a neurologist.

After the initial examination, it was recommended that he stay over for additional tests on Monday.

A team press release

said all tests came back negative and Larson feels completely fine, but his doctors felt like he should be held for more testing,

and subsequently, was unable to race at Martinsville.

Regan Smith filled-in

for him and finished 16th.

Smith, who drives full time in the Xfinity Series for JR Motorsports, has 175 career Cup starts. He has nine career Cup starts at Martinsville, with a best of 13th in 2011. He has not raced at Martinsville since April 2013.

He led 150 laps of the

258-lap race on the way to his first Truck win.

Matt Crafton, who

led six times for 100 laps,

three races this year when Busch was suspended.

Larson became the third driver to miss a race this season with medical problems.

Kyle Busch is sidelined indefinitely after breaking his right leg and left foot in the season opening Xfinity Series race at Daytona on Feb. 21.

Brian Vickers, who drives the No. 55 Toyota for Michael Waltrip, is out while being treated for blood clots. He missed the first two races, returned at Las Vegas and Phoenix, and then was pulled out of the car last week prior to the California race.

Meanwhile Joe Gibbs Racing announced that J.D. Gibbs, president of Joe Gibbs Racing, is starting treatment for symptoms impacting areas of brain function.

Gibbs has undergone a series of tests after experiencing a gradual onset of symptoms that includes speech and processing issues.

Gibbs' doctors believe the complications he has experienced were triggered by head injuries likely suffered earlier in life.

"As he goes through treatment, he will probably be doing less at the race track because he has a full week that demands quite a bit from him as he goes through treatment,"

said Joe Gibbs. "You will probably see less of him at the race track, but he'll be there on a day-to-day basis with the race team and be in all of our meetings and all of the key decisions that we make, J.D.'s going to have a huge impact on that."

NOTE: There is no NASCAR racing the weekend of April 3-5. Teams have the week off because of the Easter Holiday.
