Young Harris," Howell said.

factors to resolve, including financing, permits, and approval from GDOT, everything had finally come together and the installation was scheduled for Thursday morning, April 4th, Gibby said.

Mother Nature, however, had plans of her own, and as the thunder rolled and the rain poured down, the installation had to be delayed until Friday morning.

Mark Zinn and Eric Richards of Southern Lighting and Traffic Systems of Cumming were there bright and early on Friday morning and they had a beautiful day to install the Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons at the crosswalk directly across from Young Harris College.

The beacons were installed on each side of the crosswalk.

"We got the approval by the Council back last year when we did a presentation at one of their council meetings," Zinn said. "We had to wait for approval from the Georgia Department of Transportation. They approved it in December 2012 and we got the go ahead sometime in January."

While Zinn and Richards were installing the crosswalk lights, Young Harris College freshman Sean Burke of Blairsville was waiting to cross the street.

As he neared the men working, he said, "I'm glad to see this. It's been a long time

coming.

"This is very good; it's a plus," said Burke. "I just tried to cross and that car didn't even slow down. It didn't stop."

"I've been standing there for a while trying to cross, and drivers don't pay attention to the crosswalk," said Burke.

Burke hopes the new flashing light helps with this situation.

Several pedestrians attempting to cross the street echoed Burke's sentiments.

Once they were across and they took time to thank the workers as they walked by.

According to Zinn, the beacons are one of the fastest growing pedestrian safety devices on the market today.

"It has an 88 to 90 percent driver compliance rate.

March 31, 1923 to John Truman and Stella Brown Holmes.

He was the grandson of John W. and Martha Burch Holmes and Alex and Rutha Wilson Brown.

He attended Hiwassee Elementary School and Towns County High School. Soon after the attack on Pearl Harbor, Holmes dropped out of school during his senior year and took welding courses at Clarksville Trade School.

He then went to work in the Southeastern Shipyards in

Savannah.

In 1943, Holmes enlisted in the U.S. Navy, attended boot camp in Great Lakes, Ill., and from there transferred to Monterey, Calif., but spent most of his military time in the Aleutian Islands.

At the time of his discharge in 1946, Holmes had achieved the rank of 3rd Class Petty Officer.

Holmes married Joyce Kimsey on December 15, 1946 and they became the proud parents of four lovely daughters,

Cynthia, Sharon, Ramona, and Stephanie.

For the first 3-plus years of their marriage, Holmes served as manager of Hendrix Tourist Camp.

He took the needed courses to obtain his high school diploma and enrolled at Young Harris College.

In 1953, he became the first WWII Veteran to graduate from YHC under the GI Bill.

Holmes became Administrator of then Towns County Hospital in April 1953, a position he held for more than 30 years.

In 1971, he was honored by the Towns County Lions Club as 'Lion of the Year' and in 1973 was recognized as Citizen of the Year.

"We all unanimously agree that he is a very caring, fair, easy-going Christian man, and we are proud to call him Daddy," said daughter Sharon Payne speaking on behalf of all her sisters.

Holmes said, "I want to thank all my friends from the courthouse, Friendship Baptist Church, and the community for everything they did to make this a really good day."
