Towns County Elementary School and Towns County Middle School are Title I schools.

The school district gets additional funds from the federal government to be used at the Title I schools.

The government requires strict accountability on how these additional funds are used.

While the funds received for the Title I program make up a very small portion of overall funding for the school district, these funds are meaningful and allow the schools to have staff, equipment, resources and supplies that it otherwise would not have if it were not part of the Title I program.

As part of Towns County Schools participation in the Title I program the administration recently sent home parent surveys with elementary and middle school students.

The response of our par-

Another component of the Title I program is that we must have a Comprehensive Local Improvement Plan for the schools participating in the Title I program. prehensive Local Improvement Plan. One of the things we gained from the recent surveys is there is no one best time for you all to meet. We will have two meetings on Monday, April 21; one in the daytime at 9:30 a.m. and one in the evening at 6 p.m.

The daytime meeting will be held in the middle/high school meeting room.

The evening meeting will be held in the auditorium.

Since Towns County Schools know your time is valuable, it will do its best to keep the meetings to about one hour.

That said, Towns County Schools truly values your input and look forward to meeting with you as it plans for the 2014 - 2015 school year.

Easter Egg season is on in Towns County.

Sharp Memorial United Methodist Church hosted an Easter Egg Hunt at Mayor's Park in Young Harris on Saturday as children flocked to the Enchanted Valley to try their luck at Easter Egg hunting.

On Saturday, April 19, the recreation ball fields should be covered in young children as the Towns County Recreation Department hosts its annual Easter Egg Hunt. That event starts at 10 a.m.

Boys and girls ages 4

to 9 years old are invited to come out and hunt Easter Eggs. Entrance to the ball fields will be at the upper gate located near the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds' Office. More than 2,500 eggs, including special prize eggs will be there for the taking.

The event is free.

At 2 p.m. on Easter Sunday, the Ridges Resort & Marina will host its annual Easter Egg Hunt on the grounds of The Oaks Restaurant. Children ages 12 and under are welcomed to come and take part in the Resort's annual Easter tradition. Two areas will be designated according to the age of the children.

There is a golden prize egg for each age group, a

coloring station, popcorn and lemonade, as well as Easter tattoos.

It's a family-friendly event.

TCSO makes two drug-related arrests

Two Towns County men have been arrested and charged in separate drug-related cases, according to the Towns County Sheriff's Office.

First, a 47-year-old Hiwassee man, Terry Silvers, has been charged with conspiracy to commit a Violation of Georgia's Controlled Substance Act, use of communication facilities in the act, a felony, and reckless conduct.

The charges stem from an April 7 incident in which

Towns County sheriff's deputies responded to Chatuge Regional Hospital in reference to a possible drug overdose case, sheriff's reports show.

Upon arrival, investigators found that the victim, a male resident of Hiwassee, was being treated for complications related to an overdose of a controlled substance that was not prescribed to him.

Investigators then discovered that the victim had been in the presence of the Silvers throughout the day, and that Silvers had allegedly

offered the victim a quantity of methamphetamine earlier that day, sheriff's reports show.

Investigators made contact with Silvers, and confirmed that he had offered the victim methamphetamine. It was also found that the suspect allegedly injected the victim with a hypodermic syringe containing suspected methamphetamine, while the victim was incoherent, sheriff's reports show.

The needle reportedly

Towns County's Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax recently funded the replacement of three support vehicles in Fire & Rescue operations.

Proceeds from the voter-approved SPLOST were used to purchase two new Ford F-150 crew cab pickup trucks and a Ford Explorer Utility Vehicle.

The new trucks replaced two older Ford Ranger pickups and the utility vehicle replaced a 2002 Ford Crown Victoria.

"The Rangers served

us well, said Towns County Fire Chief Mitch Floyd, "but they were undersized for their mission."

"They were only capable of transporting two personnel and they were not safely suited for towing our Water Rescue/Recovery, Public Education, and boat trailers," Chief Floyd said.

The Crown Victoria was purchased used and had already seen service as a sheriff's patrol vehicle in a neighboring county, Chief Floyd said.

The age and excessive
